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For much of 2024, the City is focusing on its northern edge, as it works to develop its "Envision Henderson" West Henderson Road Vision Plan. The study area runs from Stonehaven Drive/Chevy Chase Court on the west, to Reed Road on the east. The planning process will include an evaluation of prior studies and plans for the corridor, a review of existing regulations, meaningful public involvement to gather community input about the corridor, consideration of prospective regulations for future redevelopment opportunities, and an exploration of complete streetscape concepts to safely accommodate all users.

The final plan will highlight an aspirational, yet achievable vision for the corridor that will be supported by policy recommendations, recommended roadway and streetscape improvements, potential site concepts, and guidance for funding and implementation.

Phase 1 Activities

As part of the initial fact-finding process, the planning team has been conducting its first round of community engagement. This has included a series of stakeholder interviews, in-person and virtual community meetings, and pop-up displays at different community events and locations.

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Bob Crane Community Center Updates



We are happy to report that construction progress at the Bob Crane Community Center is continuing on schedule, and well within budget. With installation of the exterior finishes underway, the work taking place within the structure will no longer be visible to passersby, but this is when the interior transformation kicks into high gear.

On the ground level, work has begun to dig out the space that will become the swimming pool (shown top left), one of the central features of the 155,000 sq. ft. building. The pool will include lap lanes, a water slide, zerodepth entry and a play area for kids, and will have an adjacent party room so that families can enjoy pool parties.

Parking Deck Construction

A significant enhancement to the overall Kingsdale Redevelopment Project has begun - construction of a parking deck at the north end of the Giant Eagle parking lot. Scheduled for completion by early November, in plenty of time for the holiday season, the deck will provide a total of 310 spaces on two levels. This brings the total number of spaces to more than 900, significantly exceeding parking standards for a development of this size.

While the end result will be a welcome addition at Kingsdale, current parking and access has been significantly impacted. We ask for your patience and understanding through this phase of construction, and to please continue supporting the businesses at Kingsdale.

Accessing Kingsdale and Giant Eagle is still possible from the traffic light on Northwest Blvd, with motorists guided around the construction area to

open parking area adjacent to Giant Eagle. If you are coming from the north or west of Kingsdale, we recommend using Tremont Road access points, and that you consider parking in the lots on the west side of Kingsdale. The parking garage for the apartment building is open and can be accessed from Ridgecliff Road.

You might also consider visiting during non-peak shopping hours. Other options to help reduce traffic congestion are to walk, bike or carpool.

Rooftop Solar Panels

Another exciting project - made possible thanks to a series of project costs coming in lower than budgeted - is the addition of rooftop solar panels. The panels will significantly offset operating costs, with projected savings of more than \$50,000 per year, while advancing the City's sustainability goals.

A fun addition to this project is a real-time energy savings monitor that will be on display in the lobby.

The estimated carbon offset from adding these solar panels is 215 metric tons per year - the equivalent of removing every diesel-powered vehicle owned by the City from the road each year. The reduction in greenhouse gas emissions will contribute to a cleaner and healthier environment.

Installation of the solar panels will begin this Spring, and should be complete by the end of the summer.

Community Improvement Corporation Dissolved

On April 15, City Council voted to dissolve the City's Community Improvement Corporation (CIC).

Originally formed in 1993, the CIC was a not-for-profit entity, guided by an advisory board of residents with experience in various aspects of economic development. Under Ohio Revised Code (ORC), CICs are able to purchase and sell property on a city's behalf, and can oversee the exploration of redevelopment plans and partnerships with developers. ORC requirements also include formal management and reporting mechanisms that generate annual administrative costs to the City.

Since the City has not utilized the



CIC in several years, and has no plans to acquire additional property for prospective redevelopment projects, it was determined that the UA CIC had outlived its useful life.

Moving forward, the Administration will transition the members of the CIC to an advisory body for the City's economic development activities.

If at some point in the future, the City sees value in the tools available through

a CIC, Franklin County's Central Ohio Community Improvement Corporation is available to support communities working to return distressed properties throughout the county back to productive use.

UA CARES Paramedicine Program Expands

The City's Fire Division is expanding resources for its nationally recognized community paramedicine program, UA CARES, with the deployment of two vehicles, each staffed by dedicated community paramedics five days a week to further the City's commitment to providing exceptional healthcare and social support. This strategic move comes in response to the growing demand for accessible healthcare and social services, and underscores the division's dedication to serving the community.

Since its establishment in 2018, UA CARES has emerged as a vital lifeline for residents. The program is a collaboration of efforts between Fire, EMS, and police personnel. This interdisciplinary approach ensures a swift response to urgent needs identified by first



responders, providing crucial support to the community in times of crisis.

The program has undergone several expansions to keep pace with growing demands. The integration of the former STAY UA program, initiated in 2009, into UA CARES has further enhanced service coordination and program management. UA CARES expanded its reach in 2021 to include police officers, enabling them to provide crucial follow-up care for mental health and substance use cases.

Golf Cart Regulations

Please be advised that the City is taking golf cart safety seriously. In October 2023, City Council approved amendments to the City's Under Speed Vehicle legislation. Ordinance 49-2023 removed the five-day Fourth of July exemption for non-street-legal golf carts, with the exception of UACA's use of golf carts for the Parade, and any streets closed for a Block Party.

So please remember, only street legal, licensed and inspected golf carts are allowed on our roads. Any violations are subject to your vehicle being impounded and the driver ticketed.

Edwards Green



In March of this year, the Upper Arlington Community Foundation announced the gift of green space to the community, thanks to the family of Michael and Phaedra Edwards, in honor of their parents, Peter and Suzie Edwards. Edwards Green is located at Abington and Sherwin roads. Scheduled to open in July, the future public park spans .8 acres of land in the Canterbury neighborhood. Features will include floral gardens, inviting walking paths, a stacked stone wall, bench, and a relaxing space to enjoy nature in Upper Arlington.

Solid Waste Reminders

Screening Requirements - Households should keep trash and recycling containers out of view from the street, except when putting them at the curb before collection day. Options are to store the containers in an enclosed structure, such as your garage or shed. If that is not possible, containers should be stored to the side or rear of the residence and

screened from street view. This can be accomplished with a natural landscaped barrier or with fencing that is a minimum of 42 inches in height. Full details of this requirement can be found within §7.15(A)4 of the UDO.

When to Put Containers at the Curb – In an effort to preserve community aesthetics, the City restricts the length of time that trash and recycling containers can be at the curb in advance of and following your collection day. Per UA Streets and Services Code §935.02, containers or materials for collection should not be placed at the curb any earlier than 6 pm of the day preceding collection day but must be out ready for collection by no later than 7 am of collection day. Following collection, containers must be removed from the curb and returned to their regular storage location by 7 am of the next day.

Correct Placement of Containers - For ease of access, trash and recycling containers should be placed on the grass median at least three feet apart from other items, and away from parked cars, so that crews have unobstructed access. Place containers with the lid openings on the facing into the street.

Outdoor Noise Guidelines

Forgive me if I sound a little formal in this column, but I want to be clear (but not loud) about how the City regulates noise in the community, which is done in two ways:

Noise Ordinance

In general, Section 517.14 of City Code prohibits anyone from making "unreasonably loud, disturbing and unnecessary noises of such a character, intensity and duration as to disturb the peace and quiet of the community..." Without an Outdoor Entertainment Permit, the City considers noise above 60 decibels, 100 feet from the property line, to be in violation of the code.

Outdoor Entertainment Permits

City Code has additional regulations for the hiring of "outdoor entertainment," such as DJs or musical performers.

If you wish to hire any form of outdoor entertainment for an event at your home, you must apply for an Outdoor Entertainment Permit from the City Manager's Office, and obtain written permission from more than 50% of residents within 400 feet of your property.

The Outdoor Entertainment Permit allows your event to generate up to 80 decibels of noise at the property line. The City may issue permits for events running no later than 10 pm on Sundays through Thursdays, and 11 pm on Fridays and Saturdays, as well as on Federal holidays and the day prior to each holiday. Once you have collected signatures, bring the form back to the City Manager's Office, and within three business days, we will determine if you have reached the 50% threshold. At that time, you will be required to pay a \$50 permit fee to receive your completed permit, which will clearly state the hours and decibel level allowed for your event.

Failure to obtain a permit, violation of these noise levels or falsification of any element of the application is subject to a fine of \$200.

If you plan to have an event, but do not intend to hire outdoor entertainment, you must abide by the City's Noise Ordinance. As such, your event cannot make "unreasonably loud, disturbing and unnecessary noises of such a character, intensity and duration as to disturb the peace and quiet of the community..." As noted above, the City considers noise above 60 decibels 100 feet from the property line to be in violation of the City code if you do not have an Outdoor Entertainment Permit.

Even if you aren't planning to hire outdoor entertainment, you may choose to apply for an Outdoor Entertainment Permit and complete the abovelisted process, to allow your event to generate noise higher than the normally acceptable levels. There is no charge for an Outdoor Entertainment Permit without paid entertainment.

Tri-Village Packers Food Support Program Update

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The Tri-Village Packers wishes to thank the individuals and civic groups who helped make the Spring Break food support program



a huge success. Some highlights include:

- More than 150 volunteers gave over 300 hours preparing 4,000 food items for just over 100 bags.
- This included 31 customized bags to accommodate children with special dietary restrictions.
- 62 craft kits were assembled for children under 12 years of age, including *High Five/Highlights* magazines.
- Thanks to a grant from the UA Community Foundation and gifts from the UA and Tri-Village Rotary Clubs, more than \$1,600 in grocery cards were also provided to help buy fresh produce and dairy products.



Building Permit RemindersDEVELOPMENT614-583-5070

If you have plans to remodel part of your home, our Community Development Department can help with an important first step: checking to see if your project requires a permit. Examples of projects that require a permit include:

- Constructing a deck
- Finishing or altering a basement
- If framing is removed/added to a kitchen/bathroom or the layout is altered
- If non-load-bearing walls and/ or soffits are removed, altered or added
- Adding a porch or covered entry
- Building a fence or replacing an existing fence
- If roof decking, exterior sheeting or framing is replaced, along with shingles or siding
- If an exterior wall and/or header framing is altered during window replacement

Century Home Marker Program

The Upper Arlington Historical Society partnered with the City's Community Development Department to create a Century Home Marker Program. After completing an application, qualifying households can purchase a permanent metal plaque that is customized with the year their home was built. Summer Utility InvoiceFINANCE614-583-5291

Watch for your second semi-annual utility invoice from the City in late June. This includes fees for Solid Waste, the Stormwater Utility and, in some cases, a Neighborhood Lighting Utility fee.

Garage/Yard Sales CODE COMPLIANCE 614-583-5070

Residents may conduct one garage/ yard sale during any six-month period, not to exceed three consecutive days or two days on two consecutive weekends. Sales may be held from 8 am-8 pm, with items placed for display in a garage or backyard. Any signage should be placed on private property only and should not exceed eight square feet.

Grass/Weed Control Guidelines CODE COMPLIANCE 614-583-5070

The care and maintenance of property and landscaping benefits the entire community. City code specifies that grass must not exceed 10 inches in

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height and should be kept free of noxious weeds. Failure to comply will result in notice from the City to rectify the situation within five days, at which time the City will make arrangements to cut the grass/weeds at the owner's expense.

The UA Fire Fighters Local 1521 hosts its annual flower sale fundraiser in the lead up to Mother's Day. All flower sale contributions help them support a variety of charities.

Lithium Battery Safety FIRE DIVISION 614-583-5100

Lithium batteries supply power to many different kinds of devices, such as cell phones, laptops, toys, and even cars. If not used correctly or if damaged, these batteries can overheat and catch fire. Some guidelines for proper use include:

- Always follow the manufacturer's instructions
- Only use the battery that is designed for a specific device
- Only use the charging cord that came with the device
- DO NOT charge a device under a pillow or on a bed or couch
- Stop charging the device as soon as it's reached a full charge
- Don't charge batteries at temperatures above 105°F or below 32°F

Stop using a battery if you notice an odor, change in color or shape, too much heat, leaking or odd noises. If it's safe to do so, move the battery/device away from anything that could catch fire, then call 9-1-1.

Strategic Planning Update

Since the start of the year, more than 75 volunteers have come together to work on the next strategic plan that draws from the innovative and collaborative vision of students, staff, parents/ guardians and community members to define the future of education in the Upper Arlington Schools.

This spring, a panel of representatives from those volunteer teams will share an update with the community on the process so far and solicit suggestions and feedback in the next installment of the district's Listen Learn Lead community engagement series on Thursday, May 9 at 6 pm at Upper Arlington High School, 1625 Zollinger Road.

Here is an overview of the process so far, and what is coming up next.

Winter / Spring 2024: Strategic Inquiry Process

Feedback from three stakeholder engagement opportunities – Listen Learn Lead, Dr. Hunt's UAdventure series and the districtwide equity audit – has provided the foundation for the district's next strategic plan. Those primary data points are the result of a combined 8,700 touch points that represent a wide variety of stakeholders in our community, including students in grades K-12, staff, parents/guardians and community members.

That feedback has informed the work that began in the winter of 2024, as teams made up of more than 50 students, staff, parents/guardians and community members officially kicked off the strategic planning process. The volunteers on these three Strategic Inquiry Teams have been working to identify any additional resources and research needed to inform well-supported recommendations for the three draft priority areas based on stakeholder feedback opportunities: Engaged Learning, Well-Being and Engagement, and Connection and Communication – each strengthened by a focus on continuous improvement through Excellence and Innovation.

A fourth group of volunteers, the Strategic Coordination Team, made up of more than 25 parents/guardians, staff members and community members, has been meeting regularly to receive updates from each of the inquiry teams and provide feedback and direction.

New Educational Pathways Will Give UAHS Students a Jump-start on Their Futures

Over the past year, through the Listen Learn Lead community engagement process launched by the Board of Education and my UAdventure series in the fall, I have heard from students, staff members and families about the importance of expanding the academic and career-based learning opportunities for our students to prepare them for success in their next steps in life. With that feedback in mind, I am excited to announce two important steps toward this.

In the fall, the High School will be launching new educational pathways for students for the 2024-2025 school year that will build on the exceptional programming already offered. In addition, Upper Arlington Schools is proud to be one of just 56 school districts to be awarded a new grant from the Ohio Department of Education and Workforce to support the launch of these innovative pathways.

"We are thrilled that Upper Arlington students are among the first to have access to these incredible new programs," said Upper Arlington Board of Education President Jenny McKenna. "These funds from the state will help us enhance their learning experiences."

The first of the two new pathways is the UC Early IT Microschool, a firstof-its-kind partnership with University of Cincinnati and the Past Foundation. This program will allow students to participate in a revolutionary educational experience that blurs the line between high school, college and the workforce while gaining industry credentials for careers in information technology.

The second new program is the Semiconductor Pathway in partnership with Columbus State Community College, which enables students to earn professional credentials for in-demand careers at organizations like Intel while earning high school and college credit.

The grant is a critical piece in greatly expanding opportunities for our students next year. It will provide \$496,154 to purchase equipment and provide teacher professional development for the programs. It will also cover the costs of physical updates to the facility at 1950 North Mallway Drive, the former district office, that will support these learning pathways and other programs.

In addition to the UC Early IT Microschool and the Semiconductor Pathway, the High School will be launching two additional new programs: College Jumpstart, which will allow students to earn up to 24 college credits over two years while staying within the school district, and the Teaching Professions Pathway, which will allow students to gain experience to pursue a career in education.

Our students are among the very first to have access to these new opportunities – which will allow them to have the Upper Arlington High School experience while gaining college credit, real-world experience or professional credentials tuition-free. We are proud and excited to provide them with even more opportunities to set themselves up for success now and in their futures.

During the spring of 2024, there will be multiple opportunities for stakeholders to learn about the current status of the strategic planning process and provide feedback. This began with two Coffee & Conversation events that Superintendent Robert Hunt, Ph.D., held in March and continued in April with a meeting of the Teaching and Learning Team, made up of educators from across the district. Coming up in May, the district will host a Listen Learn Lead community engagement session on Thursday, May 9 at 6 pm at Upper Arlington High School. A panel of representatives from the Strategic Inquiry Teams will share an update with the community on their work and findings to date. There will also be an opportunity for stakeholders to provide feedback to the inquiry teams on their work.

Summer/Fall 2024: Development of an Implementation Plan

Based on feedback gathered during the spring of 2024, the Strategic Coordination Team and Inquiry Teams will finalize recommendations for each priority area to present to the Board of Education. Once the recommendations are finalized, district staff, including the Teaching and Learning Team, will work to develop an implementation plan beginning with the 2025-2026 school year. Additional feedback will be gathered on the draft implementation plan in the fall of 2024.

to providing clear and transparent communication about the state of the finances of the Upper Arlington Schools. This document provides our community with a concise look at the financial state of the district and the factors that will impact our financial situation in future years.

Annual Audits: In addition to the internal Financial Update, Upper Arlington Schools also relies on external, third-party reviews of the district's finances. Each year, the state auditor's office sends a team to audit the Upper Arlington school district, delving into financial records and reviewing the district's practices. Upper Arlington Schools is proud to consistently earn a clean audit opinion and the Auditor of State Award, most recently for the

Winter 2024/2025: **Strategic Plan Launch**

Based on all of the feedback gathered from stakeholders during the summer and fall of 2024, the district will finalize an implementation plan to present to the Board of Education for approval in January 2025.

For updates on the strategic planning process, please visit www.uaschools.org/strategicplan. 2022-2023 school year, recognizing our commitment to effective and accountable financial practices for the community.

- Five Year Forecast: The five year forecast is a legally required document that is completed twice a year, in November and May, and submitted to the Ohio Department of Education (ODE) following approval by the Board of Education. The document, which covers three years of actual data and five years of anticipated revenues and expenditures, provides an important check-in point for our district, so that we can keep a clear view on what future impacts and needs are.
- Monthly Financial Reports: The monthly financial reports offer an in-depth look at revenue collections, expenditures and the district's cash balance as it stands for the month and over the course of the fiscal year.

Thanks to a strong bond-investment strategy, higher interest rates, and the completion of construction on time and on budget with fewer change orders than expected, the district will also be able to address a significant facilities need eliminated in the first phase of the master plan. By utilizing remaining bond interest funds, we will move forward with window replacement in the older areas of Barrington Elementary School this summer, just as we did at Tremont Elementary School last year.

The summer projects also include renovation work, funded by a state grant, at the former district office at 1950 North Mallway Drive. This building will become the home of new educational pathways available to Upper Arlington High School students beginning this fall.

UAHS Girls Swimming Wins 13th State Title

The UA High School girls swimming and diving returned to the top of the podium at the 2024 state championships in Canton on February 25, winning their first team title since 2017.

The girls team completed a championship sweep in three relays: the 200 medley (McCall Freiburger, Maren Berg, Riley Hollingsworth. and Abigail Oliphant); the 200 free (Lizzie Oliphant, Ashton Mumaw, Riley Hollingsworth and Hayden Hollingsworth); and the 400 free relay (McCall Freiburger, Lizzie Oliphant, Blaine Huddleston and Riley Hollingsworth). Senior Hayden Hollingsworth also brought home an individual championship, winning the 50 free. In addition, Madi Vermillion placed fifth in the state in the diving championships.

The boys team finished their season state runners-up, with three third-place relay finishes in the 200 free, 400 free and 200 medley and a second place finish in the 500-yard freestyle by senior Reid Caswell.

This is the 13th state championship overall for the girls swimming and diving program.

'Norwester' Turns the Page With Its 100th Volume

This spring, as Upper Arlington High School prepares to celebrate its 100th graduating class, it will also publish the 100th volume of what is now known as the *Norwester*.

While the school "annual," as it was known at the time, was first published in 1923, the 1925 edition is officially labeled as volume one – coinciding with the opening of Upper Arlington's first school building, now known as Jones Middle School, and Upper Arlington's first graduating class.

Two years later, in 1927, the yearbook officially became known as the *Norwester*, likely in a nod to the name of the community's first magazine, The Norwester Magazine, published from November 1917 to March 1922. In the thousands of pages published since volume one, the *Norwester* has chronicled the experience within and history of Upper Arlington's schools – including the origin

of the Golden Bear mascot, which first appeared in the 1928 edition, and the change in school colors from orange and black to gold and black in the 1941 edition. It has also

documented the opening of new school buildings – from the Jones building in 1924 to the Ridgeview Road high school in 1957 to the current building in 2021.

Norwester readership has ebbed and flowed with the changes in the schools, too. It initially served as a yearbook for students in grades 1 through 12, but that changed in 1939, when Barrington Elementary School opened its doors for students in grades 1-6. And, from 1956 to 1984, you'll find only grades 10-12 in the *Norwester*, because only those grades attended the Upper Arlington High School building on Ridgeview Road at that time.

Facilities Update


Here are the latest developments under our Master Facilities Plan.


