KEY STAKEHOLDER SUMMARY

1.1 OVERVIEW

As part of the Community Center Feasibility Study, The City of Upper Arlington seeks to understand the level of need, what are the priorities for potential indoor spaces dedicated to parks and recreation, and help to determine if and how the City should move forward to address the need. The planning process began with soliciting community input. Specifically, the initial community input process sought to establish a baseline understanding of:

What are the strengths within the system, as it pertains to facilities and programs?

What programs should/could be offered in a new community center, if developed?

What indoor recreational spaces are most needed in a new community center, if developed?

What is the most critical element in getting a new community center built that the Task Force and Planning Team need to make sure is addressed as part of the feasibility study?

What are the key partnerships that should be considered (development and operations)?

What ideas do you have about funding the development of the facility and funding operations?

To establish the baseline understanding, the Planning Team conducted a series of stakeholder interviews and focus group discussions, as well as an initial data gathering public forum. The following sections summarize and highlight the key findings from the community input process.

2.1 STAKEHOLDER INTERVIEWS

Over a two-week period in January 2020, the Planning Team conducted interviews by phone that included almost 40 individuals. These interviews included key stakeholders in the community.

3.1 SYNTHESIS AND KEY THEMES

Based on feedback from these stakeholder interviews, the following key themes regarding the feasibility of a new community center emerged. It should be noted, however, this summary reflects responses provided by interview participants and comments do not necessarily constitute Planning Team recommendations.

- Most of the Key Stakeholders have used the facilities and programs as visitors and participants. Some have affiliation with the City of Upper Arlington Parks and Recreation is through partnerships in facility use and programming. Many of the Key Stakeholders are residents of Upper Arlington and serve the community as part of an organization. Several have rented shelters, registered and participated in programs, walk the trails, take dogs to the park, have had kids in the youth sports programs, visited a pool, used the playgrounds, and are members of the Senior Center. Everyone interviewed, who has participated in programs, stated there is an overwhelming need for dedicated parks and recreation indoor spaces.
- Many agree that the staff expertise and distribution of parks are the greatest strengths which
 has enabled the system to provide high-quality services and equity in access. The facilities
 and services highlighted as strengths of the system are The Amelita Mirolo Barn, lifelong learning
 programs, playgrounds, Tremont Pool, events that bring the community together, natural areas
 and open space, maintenance of the parks and facilities, walking paths, youth sports fields, and
 Senior Center programming.

Key Stakeholders identified a couple of big challenges when responding to the question about the system strengths. The lack of indoor dedicated space and the aging Senior Center does not reflect the City's efforts toward improving quality of life. A new community center could alleviate both of these and take the City's parks and recreation system and services to the next level.

- A significant number of existing programs can transition to the potential community center and new recreational trends, if developed. The programs that were identified as being offered in a new community center are senior programming, group fitness, fundamentals of visual arts, cultural arts, culinary arts, lifelong learning programs, learn to swim, specific condition rehabilitation, tutoring, youth sports and clinics, training/conditioning programs, nutrition programs, adult sports, dance classes, life skills programs, preschool programs and childcare for adults using the facility. In addition to these programs, many believe that the facility should not be programmed to the point that it interferes with membership benefits, such as open gym.
- A new community center should have a balance of programming spaces and passive recreation spaces that members/visitors can use at their leisure. Spaces that support this approach are community gathering spaces with various types of seating, walking track, indoor pool for lap swim and play, lazy river for water fitness, therapy pool, fitness room, group fitness rooms, multi-purpose rooms, demonstration kitchen, café, support staff spaces, storage, indoor multi-use turf field, indoor playground, dedicated senior space, stage for performance and lectures, intergenerational spaces, large reception room with kitchenette, stretching areas, and gymnasium. Gym space was brought up by almost all Key Stakeholders. Many elaborated to comment that the City could not overbuild the gyms. Many believe there needs to be at least four gyms for open gym and programs.
- The most critical element of getting a new community center built that needs to be addressed is the funding strategy. The funding strategy should be a creative mixture of public and private dollars towards development and operations. Many went on to include that the operational cost



should have user fees that support the facility. The user fees should take into account that the community will be paying for the development of the facility and be reasonable. In addition, many of the Key Stakeholders added that ongoing community engagement and location of the facility were also critical elements to be addressed. Many believe that the ongoing community engagement is the key to ensuring the residents are comfortable with moving forward.

• All Key Stakeholders believe that the health and wellness industry is one of the key partnerships that should be explored as part of development and operations of a new community center. Each of the local employers within the health and wellness industry that were interviewed expressed and interest in exploring partnerships. In addition, many believe that a community center could serve as a conduit for other much needed public services. Partnerships with other similar service providers can help alleviate the burden of operations and the associated expenditures by spreading it out across multiple providers. One such provider that is interested in exploring a partnership is the YMCA of Greater Columbus.

A couple of unique partnerships were offered up by Stakeholders. One such partnership is if the location previously occupied by Macy's was selected as the site. This partnership would be for mixed use of the site to include residential with a little retail and a community center. This could include a membership component for the residents in the mixed-use residential units. The second unique partnership is with colleges and universities to develop a wing of the center to be an incubator for recreation and fitness degrees. Students would gain hands on teaching that could help alleviate operational overhead. Students would serve as staff in the facility to help with operations as part of their degree.

Key Stakeholders agree that all potential funding sources should be considered to alleviate the
full cost of development being covered by the taxpayers. Many believe the efforts should include
a "Legacy" capital campaign with naming rights as a major component with Upper Arlington
being an affluent community. They expressed how much the park system has touched all of the
resident's lives in a positive way over the years, helping to build valuable memories with their
families. This is something that people will support if a capital campaign is part of the overall



mix of funding. Additional funding in the form of corporate naming rights were suggested for the build out of the demonstration kitchen, fitness room, multi-use spaces, indoor play area, and fieldhouse or gymnasium. Additional suggestions about funding for development and operations are:

- o Use expiring bonds and rollover to support this project without raising taxes.
- o Explore all applicable grant opportunities.
- o Sell the land the Senior Center is on now for development.
- Sell bricks to line the walkway to the entrance.
- o Use City reserves to bring down the cost.
- o Explore other taxes that can support this, like food & beverage or hotel/motel tax.
- o Run as many tournaments as possible in the facility to generate revenue to offset expenditures.
- o Identify and communicate the combination of tax dollars and user fees.
- o Develop leased spaces for other organizations and businesses.
- o Banking location in the facility or other business providers.
- o Real Estate tax or impact fee.
- o Named restaurant group to be a part of the facility.
- o YMCA has the ability to bring in private donations with national recognition.

Key Stakeholders additional comments, questions, concerns or suggestions:

- Change is difficult for seniors, very important to keep sense of community for them.
- Locate the rec center in populated areas where people live and there are businesses, so it will be used.
- Keep it in a dynamic setting.
- For a good location -they may have to demo some single-family homes to make it fit in an area it will be seen and used.
- The Kroger owned space would be ideal for a Community Center. If we could leverage them into being a partner.
- Land is hard to come by in UA. We need to consider options that may border Upper Arlington.
- While indoor space is the focus, exterior amenities would be nice (pavilion, walking paths, gardens).
- Consider a new community center at the site of the current City Municipal Complex. The building can be raised and one facility for the community and the City operations.
- A meeting room that opens to the outdoors into a sort of outdoor classroom would be appealing.
- Adding significant amount of gym space offered to the community when not in use. Schools are somewhat community centers after school.
- Gym space will be an issue. No danger of overbuilding gym space.
- If it is determined to be feasible. We would like to develop a first-class facility that fits within the community and standards up to this point.
- It will be interesting to hear what the taxpayers say about the center.
- Spoke to numerous people who want it, because there is nothing to do, nowhere to go. Close proximity and less travel time. People in UA are active and always wanting to do things.
- Taxes are a hard sell to just put it on the taxpayer.
- The Stand Project would love to see if there is an opportunity to partner as well.
- All we are talking about is **the what's and the ifs. We** are creating an agenda and a forum for those that want this. What are we doing to create an agenda and a forum for those that are against it?
- Do we have an avenue to engage and educate the people against the needs of the community? Pop-ups should also be for what people do not want.



- Can a sign board be created that asks if you are for or against? If against, what is it that makes it not of interest.
- We need to hear from both groups of seniors those that use the senior center and those that do not.
- Is there an advantage to constructing a few of the centers in different locations of the community like the parks are currently distributed?
- Thinking of a place where residents that are home-bound or bed-ridden. Think of ways to help these folks, with technology to engage them call in story time, discussion or an audio class for these folks.
- Financial Sustainability is critical
- Self-supporting level, what is the reasonable amount?
- Regardless of how it is built, collaboration is absolutely necessary!
- Helpful to get the crowdsourcing website up and running. Try to get a story in the paper each week as to where we are in the process.
- We need to follow up with people who want to be involved and define how we can have them help. This is imperative.
- Bummed that the City Council agreed to take it to a vote. If something goes wrong, then the people who did not want it, they will use it as an example to bash the officials.
- Is the ballot thing yes or no, or is it a choice of one thing over another? This should be framed soon. People will want to know. People will start asking.
- Tennis people need to be a part of the conversation.
- Think about us as advocates. We can help with that as well.
- Good to have in the forefront the status of the Macy's building. Majority of the community is assuming that this is a potential location. If it is or if it is not, it needs to be communicated to the public. It needs to be repeated.
- Long overdue to have a facility like this.





STAKEHOLDER FOCUS GROUP SUMMARY

Phase 1

Upper Arlington Community Center Feasibility Study

OVERVIEW

On February 5th and 6th, eight focus groups were conducted in 1-hour sessions to gather feedback on participant's level of support for a community center and key issues and opportunities related to the development of a community survey. Nearly 70 people participated in the eight focus groups, which included active sports, arts and culture, the business community, community organizations, lifelong learning, recreation, and seniors (two sessions were held for seniors).

During each session, participants were given a brief introduction about the study including a description of the Community Center Feasibility Task Force, an overview of the project process, and information about what a community center may include.

Following the introduction, participants were asked to individually complete a worksheet with the following questions:

- 1. Would your organization benefit from having access to a community center (Yes or No)? If yes, how would it be a benefit? If no, how would it be a disadvantage?
- 2. What should be included in a community center?
- 3. What current challenges do you have in finding space for programming and events?
- 4. What would be the most critical elements for the task force or City to address related to a community center?

After participants had time to individually complete the worksheets, a facilitator(s) led a group discussion on the responses to the questions. Feedback from the group conversation was recorded on flip-chart paper.

WHAT DID WE HEAR?

Upon analyzing the output from the focus groups, there were common themes or findings from the feedback. These findings are outlined in more detail below (in no specific order). There are also user-specific comments that were shared by each group.

Level of Support

Nearly all participants showed a strong level of support for the development of the community center. Generally, people who were moderately supportive desired more information and specifics on funding, cost, and location of the community center. The consultant team shared general information about potential funding options and location, but expressed that more specifics would come later in the study, should a community center be needed and desired in the community. However, overall, the feedback from the Stakeholder Focus Groups did demonstrate a need and interest for a community center within the City.

Key Findings - All Stakeholder **Focus Groups**

- It is important all user groups are served and supported through the design and programing of a future facility. This includes people of different ages (e.g. older adults, teens, families) and people with different interests or activities (e.g. recreation, arts, volunteer).
- Participants noted a higher level of support if the center does not consume existing green space or open space within the City.
- There is a strong desire to have a central gathering space within the City as well as a central point to connect and share community information.
- · A future facility accessible by all modes of travel including driving, biking, and walking. This includes people of all ages and abilities.
- There is a desire for the facility to be centrally located in the community.
- Participants felt programming within the facility should not duplicate, but instead support, existing offerings by local businesses and public organizations.
- Currently, user groups lack adequate access to use existing facilities, such as in the schools.
- There is a STRONG need for a place that allows middle school and high school students to gather informally outside of school hours.
- Active sports groups feel there is inadequate space in the community to serve existing and projected youth sports activities.
- It is important the facility be funded through creative options and partnerships that will lessen the burden on the community.
- There is a strong need for a variety of flexible meeting spaces within the community that are affordable and equipped with the technology and amenities (e.g. food service).
- Currently, there is a "flight" out of Upper Arlington for meeting and activity space. Participants noted a community center would help keep residents in and connected to the City.

- Many focus groups participants noted that they are currently members at other community centers within the region, but would prefer to be a member within their own community.
- Participants felt there is a need for facilities for special needs children. Additionally, inclusiveness and universal design were mentioned as important elements in a future facility.

Key Take-Aways By User Group **Active Sports**

- The school facilities are not currently able to meet the needs of the active sports groups. When active sports do have access to school facilities, they feel some of the facilities are inadequate and the hours that are offered to them are usually late and disrupt schedules for participants (e.g. conflicts with family time, bedtime, doesn't promote healthy lifestyles).
- An ideal facility would accommodate multiple family members at once, where each person can be participating in their individual activity at the same time (e.g. parent working, child studying or participating in swim lessons).
- Currently, people are going outside of the City for activities, although, they prefer to stay within the community.
- Some programs are actually turning children away, such as swimming, because there isn't enough space to accommodate the interest.
- There is a need for turf fields for sports.
- There is a need for facilities for children with special needs.

Arts & Culture

- Spaces that are flexible and accessible are important.
- Facilities should include adequate storage space for many different materials and tools.
- Current offerings that satisfy the need within the City should not be duplicated.
- The design should consider integrating art and/or a

gallery into the space.

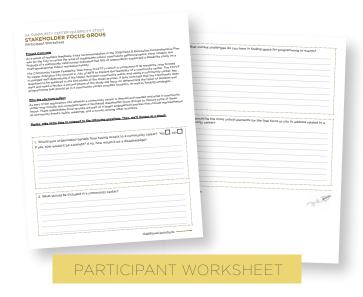
- Groups are competing for space in schools, which are not currently meeting their needs.
- The arts and culture groups need a "home."
- A performance hall or room that can host a variety of performing arts such as youth bands and plays is desired in a community center.

Business Community

- There is a need for many different types of meeting spaces with amenities that include access to catering and easy to use technology.
- Location and cost of a proposed community center are very important factors to the business community.
- A community center should be an attractive hangout space for the community, especially teenagers (e.g. coffee shop).
- Participants emphasized the importance of making sure there is a need within the local market for a community center and to ensure it adds to the community and does not detract from current business.
- Flexibility within the facility is a desirable attribute.
- A multi-generational facility is desired to accommodate all age ranges.

Community Organizations

- There is a need for affordable meeting space of many different sizes, especially large meeting space (hundreds of people).
- There was support for a community center that accommodates more than sports and recreation.
- The City already has great outdoor parks and recreation but there is a need for space indoors during colder months.
- There is a desire to have space for teenagers to use as an outlet from school.
- Spaces should be flexible and the center should offer a wide range of hours.



Lifelong Learning / Education

- Many child programs (e.g. after school programs, summer programs, special education) are in high demand and they are very competitive to get into, often turning away families.
- The group felt the center needs to encompass what is truly needed by residents, so it has long-term support and high usage.
- There are many opportunities to partner with existing organizations for programming the facility.
- There is a community-wide need for additional special education programs.

Recreation

- It is desired to have spaces that are flexible and are highly accessible.
- There is a desire to have a central space within the City for gathering and to build community.
- A central location and creative funding options are important considerations for the future.
- All user groups should be supported through the design and programing of the future facility.

Seniors

- There is strong support to build a community center that is multi-generational and has a "senior center" component.
- This user group supported having a dedicated space and time for seniors.
- Programming and space for intergenerational activities is desired.
- An important attribute to this group was having a community center that is highly accessible by driving, biking, walking, and transit.
- The group felt facilities should support a range of activities including recreation, health, food, and arts.



There is clear support for a community center from these Stakeholder Focus Groups. There is also a desire to further examine specific priorities for a center within Upper Arlington. Many expressed a desire for a future facility that supports all people within the community, and offers a range of facilities and activities. Many people showed support for a facility that is multi-generational and highly accessible by all modes of travel. A central location, funding, and cost of the facility were also important factors to consider from the groups.



COMMUNITY POP-UP SUMMARY

Phase 1

Upper Arlington Community Center Feasibility Study

OVERVIEW

During the Months of January, February, and March a series of community pop-up events were held to gather community feedback on the potential creation of a community center. A total of twelve pop-up events were scheduled. This included the following locations.

- 2020 State of the City
- UA High School Basketball games (x2)
- Volunteer UA Expo
- Elementary and Middle School Gallery Reception (x2) (MSC)
- Tremont Library
- UA Stage (UA High School dinner production)
- Giant Eagle Market District Wine Night
- High School Production of Cinderella
- **UA Senior Center**
- Hastings Middle School Production of Frozen

Each pop-up included participation from 20-50 residents, with a total participation of approximately 460 residents.

Activity Overview

A series of mobile boards were created to facilitate community input. Participants at each location were ask to participate on a voluntary basis. The boards were designed to self guide participants, and taskforce members were also on hand to assist participants in the activities. The following questions were asked as part of the pop-up activities.

Key Findings/Results

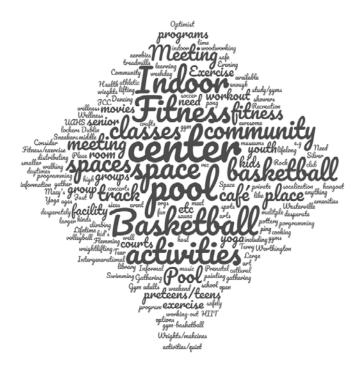
The following are the key findings from the pop-up events.

Q: What is your level of support for an Upper Arlington community center?

Out of a total of 460 responses the average score was a 4.66 out of 5 (1 not supportive at all, 5 very supportive)

Q: What types of facilities do you use or activities do you participate in now? This could include gathering with friends, painting for fun, or even rock climbing!

The number of responses were received with this question. The following word cloud illustrates the results. The larger the word the greater the frequency of the mention/response.

COMMUNITY MEETING SUMMARY

Phase 1

Upper Arlington Community Center Feasibility Study

OVERVIEW

On February 27th a public meeting was held and the Upper Arlington Community Center to gather feedback on participant's level of support for a community center and key issues and opportunities related to the development of a community survey. Nearly 40 people participated in the meeting from the general public.

A presentation was given by the consultant team at the beginning of the meeting. The presentation covered the project purpose, scope, schedule, and review of the meeting activities. Following the presentation participants broke into small groups to conduct table activities to consider the development of a community center.

During the table work participants used post-it notes to record what they think are the biggest issues and opportunities related to the development of the community center. After each participant completed their post-its they shared them as a group and put them on a group board. The last step of activity was the completion of a level of support card. The card asked for each individuals level of support on a scale from 1-5 with 1 not supportive at all, 5 very supportive.

Upper Arlington Community Center Feasibility Survey Executive Summary

Overview

ETC Institute administered a survey to explore the feasibility of developing a multi-generational community center in Upper Arlington. The data from this assessment will be used to determine the level of support residents have for the development of a community center facility.

Methodology

ETC Institute mailed a survey packet to a random sample of households in Upper Arlington. Each survey packet contained a cover letter, a copy of the survey, and a postage-paid return envelope. Residents who received the survey were given the option of returning the survey by mail or completing it online at www.uacommunityCenterSurvey.org.

Ten days after the surveys were mailed, ETC Institute sent emails to the households that received the survey to encourage participation. The emails contained a link to the online version of the survey to make it easy for residents to complete the survey. To prevent people who were not residents of Upper Arlington from participating, everyone who completed the survey online was required to enter their home address prior to submitting the survey. ETC Institute then matched the addresses that were entered online with the addresses that were originally selected for the random sample. If the address from a survey completed online did not match one of the addresses selected for the sample, the online survey was not counted.

The goal was to obtain completed surveys from at least 400 residents. The goal was exceeded with a total of 632 residents completing the survey. The overall results for the sample of 632 households have a precision of at least +/-3.9% at the 95% level of confidence.

The major findings of the survey are summarized below and on the following pages.

Community Center Features

- Sixty-six percent (66%) of respondents use indoor recreation, sports, fitness, meeting space, and/or aquatic facilities.
- The top potential features that respondents indicated they would use most frequent, based on the sum of "several times per week" and "a few times per month" responses among residents who had an opinion, were: weight room/cardiovascular equipment area (63%), indoor running/walking track (59%), aerobics/fitness/martial arts/dance space (49%), and lap lanes for exercise swimming (44%).
- Features that respondents indicated adults would use most often in the community center, based on the sum of respondents' top four choices, were: weight room/cardiovascular equipment area (57%), indoor running/walking track (44%), and aerobics/fitness/martial arts/dance space (37%).
- Features that respondents indicated youth would use most often in the community center, based on the sum of respondents' top four choices, were: leisure pool zero depth entry (21%), multipurpose courts (17%), rock climbing wall (14%), and unstructured indoor place space (14%).
- Most respondent households (80%) would use the community center for exercise and fitness. Sixty-seven percent (67%) of respondents would use the community center for classes and 62% would use the community center for aquatics.
- The highest level of agreement with various statements regarding a community center, based on the sum of "strongly agree" and "agree" responses among residents who had an opinion, were: a community center should generate revenue from user fees (79%), I believe a community center would boost property values in our community (71%), and it is valuable to have a community center (71%).

Membership/Fees

Respondents were asked how they would prefer to pay for membership and fees to a community center.

- 37% of respondents would prefer paying to use the community center with a monthly family pass
- 23% of respondents would prefer paying to use the community center with a monthly adult pass
- 14% of respondents would prefer paying to use the community center with a monthly senior center access only
- 7% of respondents would prefer to use the community center by pay per visit

- 27% of respondents would be willing to pay less than \$30 per month

Monthly Senior Individual Pass

- 8% of respondents would be willing to pay \$50 or more per month
- 20% of respondents would be willing to pay \$40-\$49 per month
- 23% of respondents would be willing to pay \$30-\$39 per month
- 49% of respondents would be willing to pay less than \$30 per month

Daily Adult Fee

- 10% of respondents would be willing to pay \$10 or more per visit
- 13% of respondents would be willing to pay \$8-\$9 per visit
- 28% of respondents would be willing to pay \$6-\$7 per visit
- 50% of respondents would be willing to pay \$5 or less per visit

Daily Child Fee

- 18% of respondents would be willing to pay \$8 or more per visit
- 11% of respondents would be willing to pay \$7 per visit
- 2% of respondents would be willing to pay \$6 per visit
- 36% of respondents would be willing to pay \$5 per visit
- 33% of respondents would be willing to pay \$4 or less per visit

Support of Tax Increase

Sixty-five percent (65%) of respondents indicated they are "very supportive" of increasing taxes to support the construction of a community center. Fourteen percent (14%) of respondents are "somewhat supportive" of increasing taxes, 7% indicated they were "neutral," 3% indicated they

were "somewhat unsupportive" and 10% were "not supportive at all" of the increase in taxes. Of the respondents that indicated they were unsupportive (13%) of increasing taxes to support the construction of a community center, over half (54%) indicated the reason was because their household would not use it and 51% indicated they are unsupportive because they don't support using tax dollars.

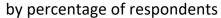

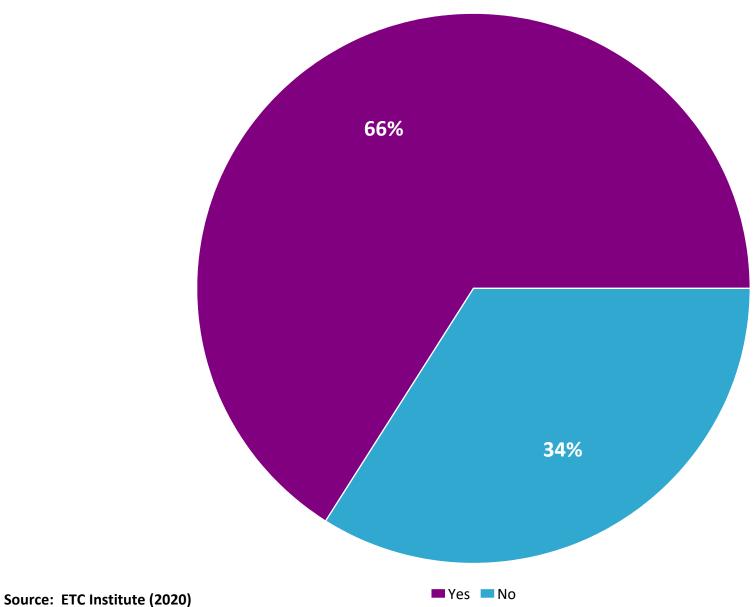

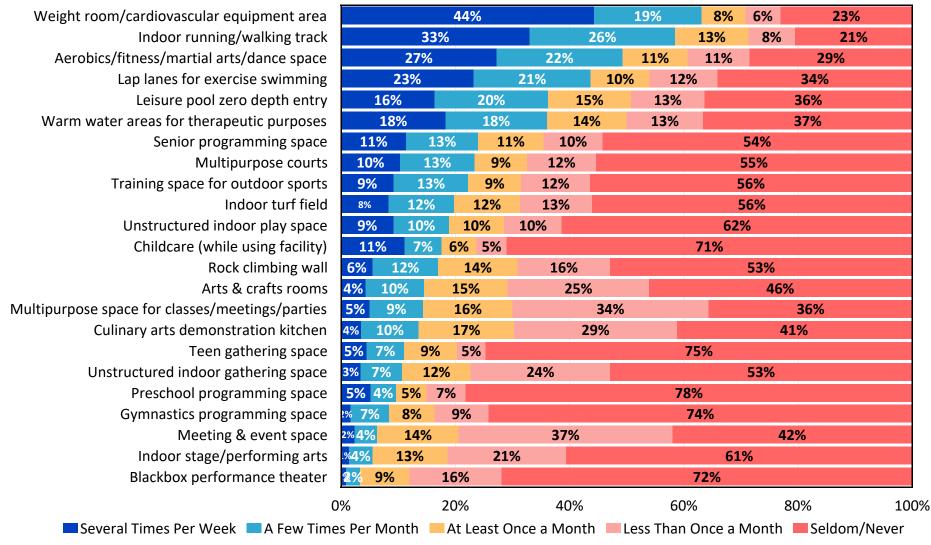
Q1. Are you or other members of your household currently using any INDOOR recreation, sports, fitness, meeting space or aquatic facilities?





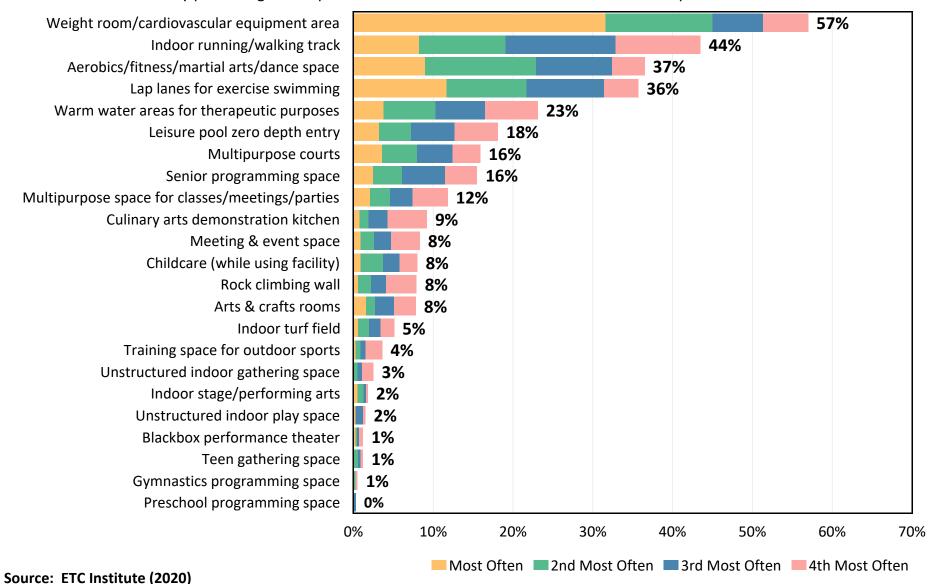

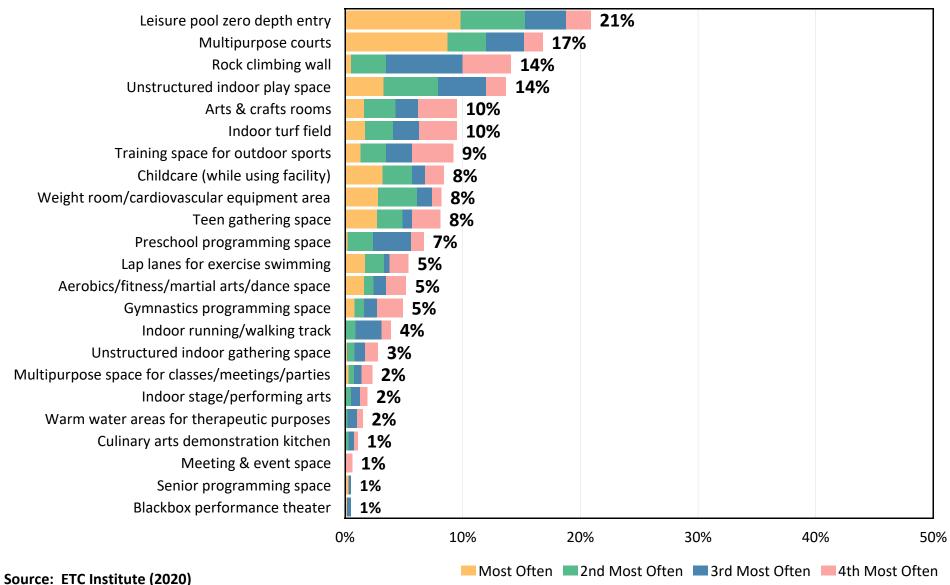

by percentage of respondents who selected the items as one of their top four choices



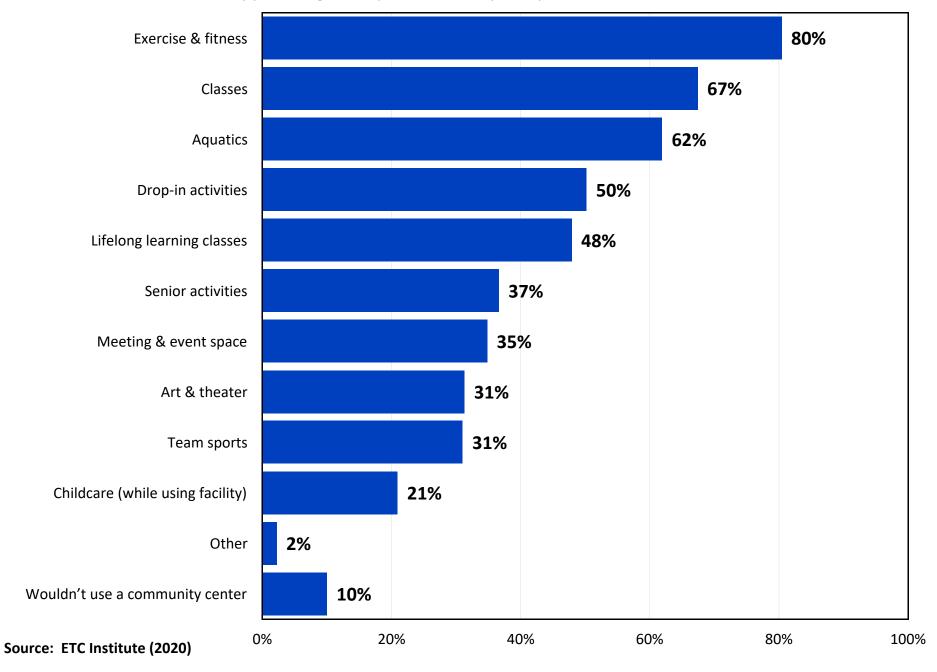

by percentage of respondents who selected the items as one of their top four choices



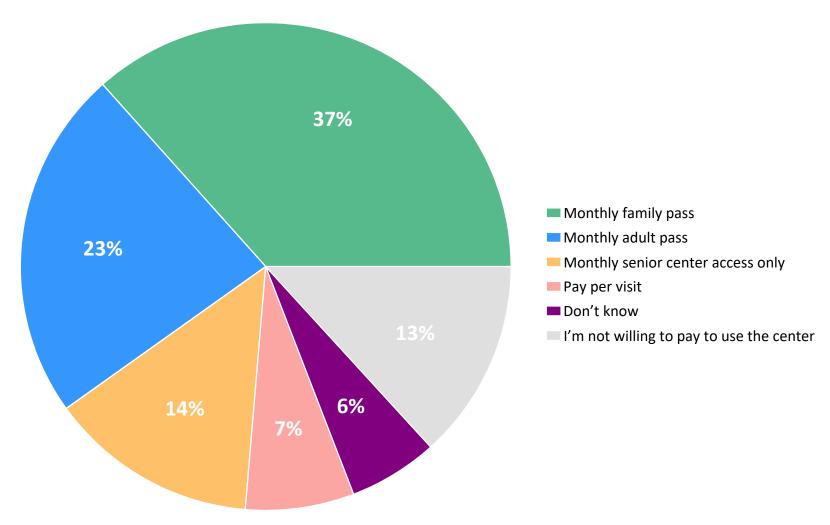
Q5. All activities your household would use at a community center

by percentage of respondents (multiple responses could be selected)



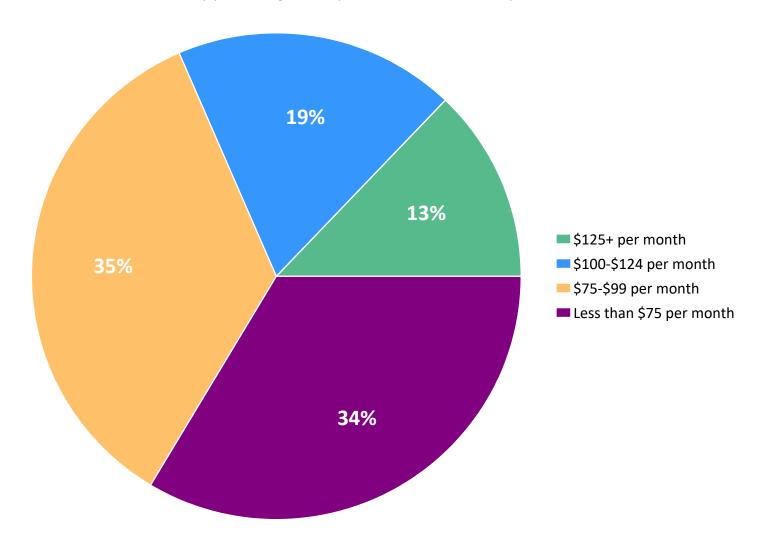

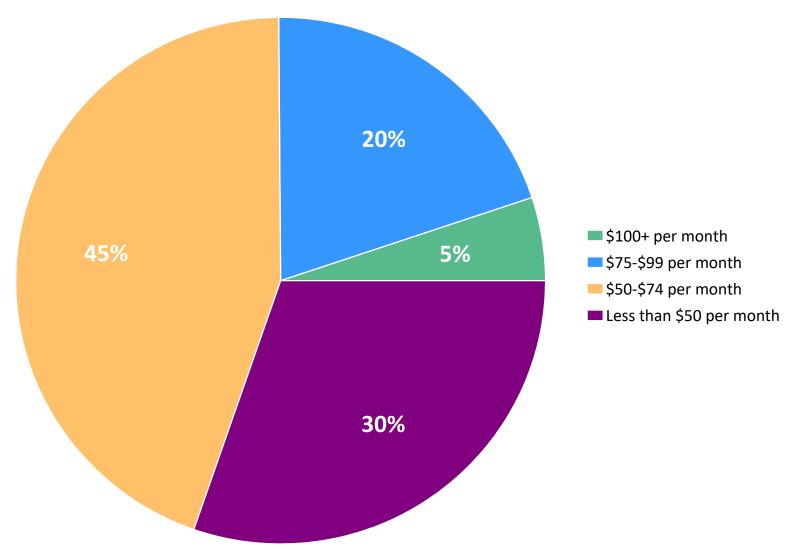

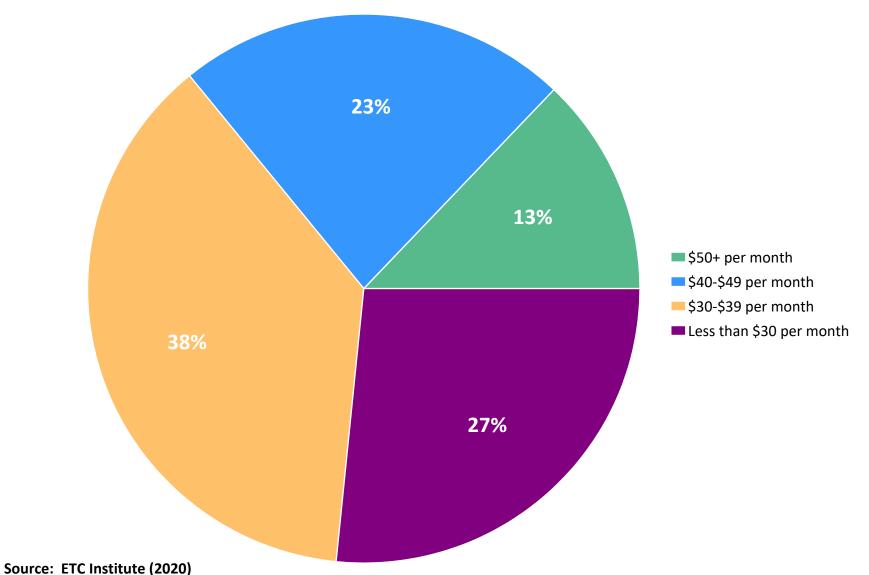

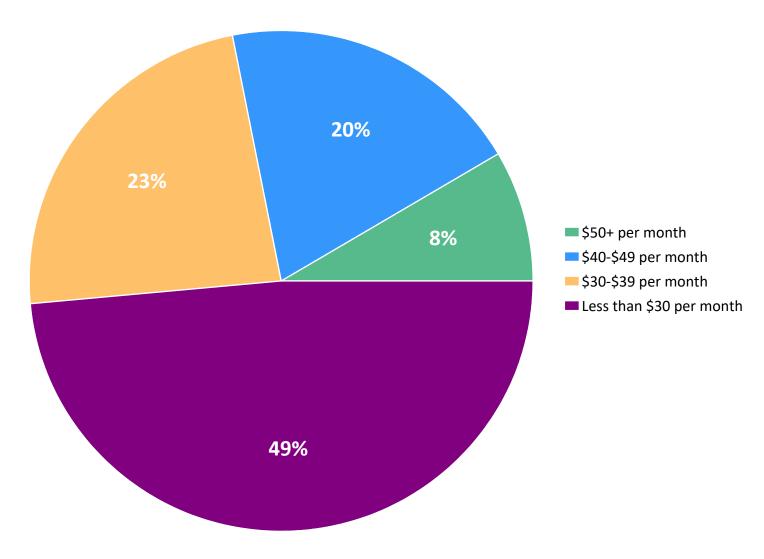

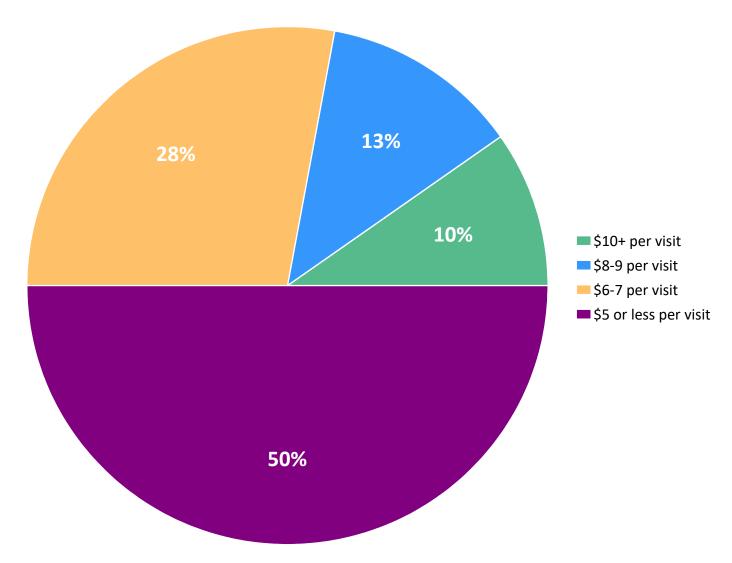

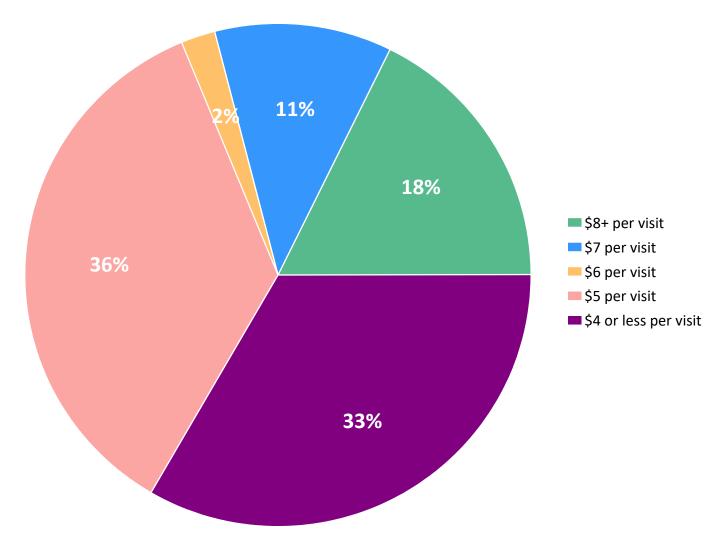
Q6e. What is the MAXIMUM amount you would be willing to pay for a DAILY ADULT fee to use a new multigenerational community center if it had the features most important to your household?

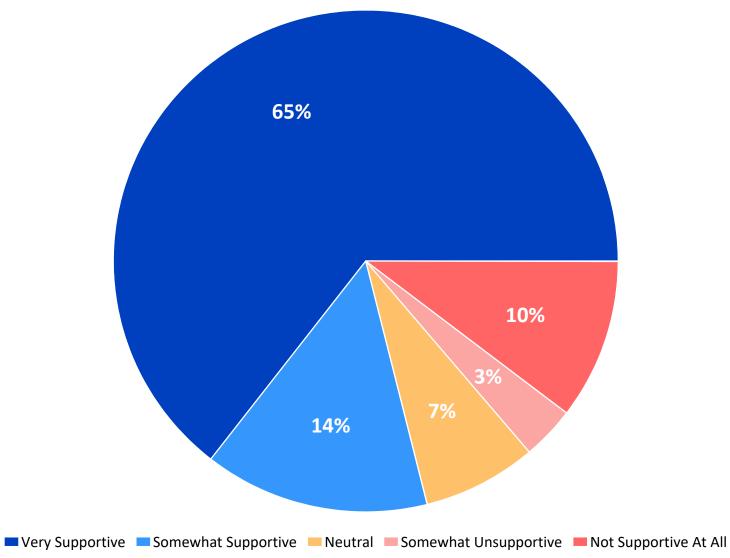
Q6f. What is the MAXIMUM amount you would be willing to pay for a DAILY CHILD fee to use a new multigenerational community center if it had the features most important to your household?

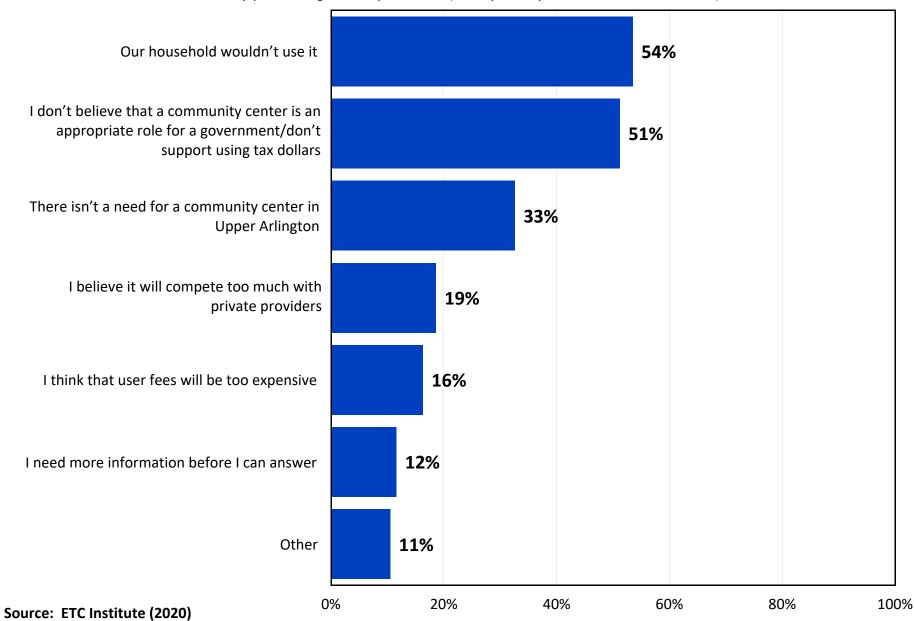
Q7. How strongly would you support the construction of a community center that included the features most important to your household, if it could be accomplished without increasing taxes on residents?



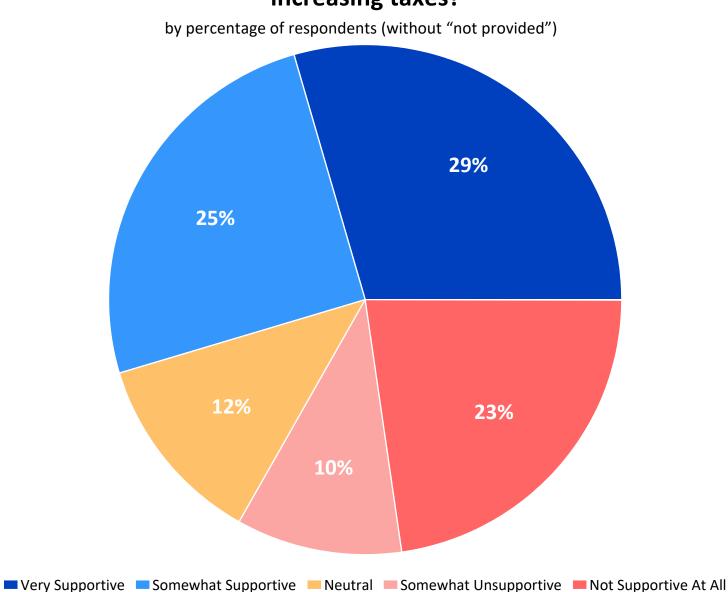

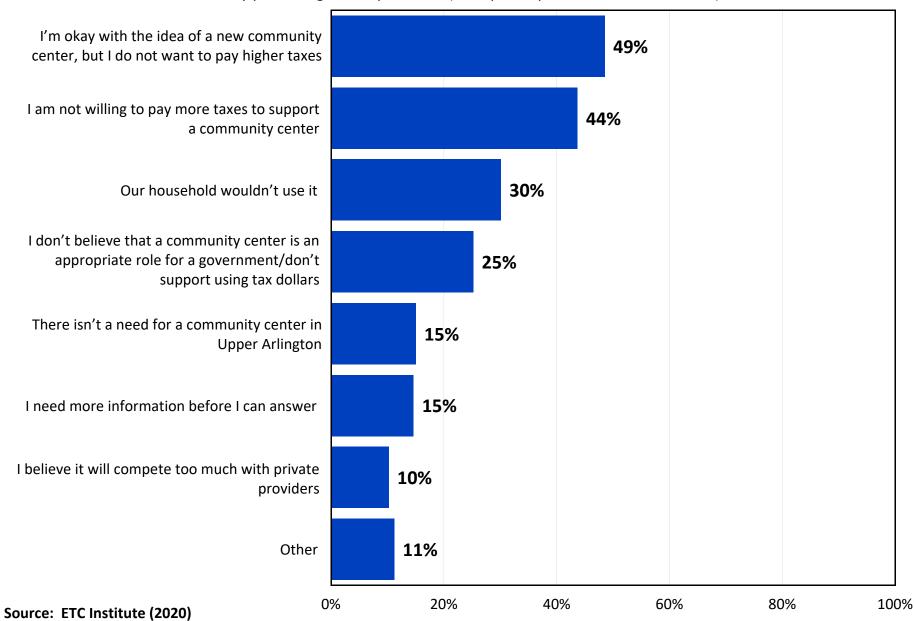


Q8. How strongly would you support the construction of a community center that included the features most important to your household, if it required increasing taxes?



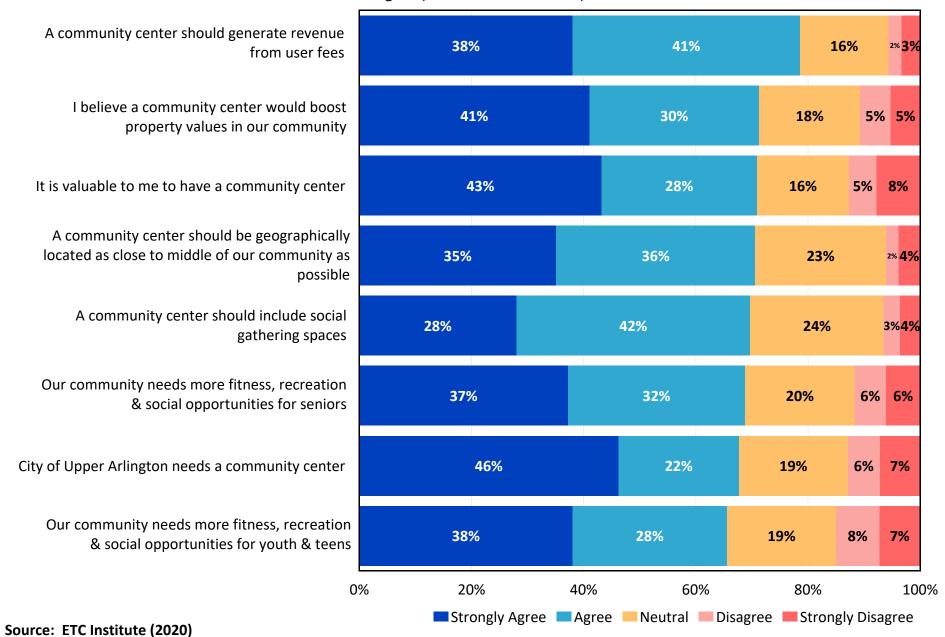

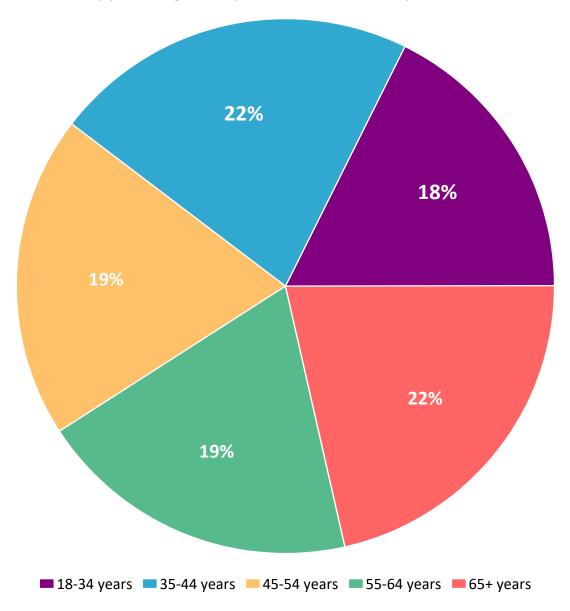

- A community center is the only thing this community is missing; my wife and I strongly support this.
- A family friendly community center would significantly enhance the quality of life for our family throughout the year. We currently spend a substantial time, effort, and money to seek the recreational programming that we need to maintain our family's health and well-being. Much of this we need to seek outside of UA, meaning that the time is frequently the most precious resource. A community center that is centrally located would give us more time in the day to actually participate in programming rather than spending that time transporting the family to and from. We would much rather spend our money on a community resource than on commercial programming and programming outside of our community. I know not every family is willing to spend a lot of money on this type of thing. But I want you to know that our family will gladly pay whatever it takes (within reason). For far too long, the "community center" of UA has been Scioto Country Club which is inaccessible to a large proportion of the community. A true community center would be a large step toward equity and inclusion in our city.

- I like the idea of it serving as a social hub.
- I like the idea of it, but we are members at Scioto CC which provides most of these things, so I don't see us using it at all. Kids are all grown. BUT they are living in UA and are having children so it may be something they'd use?
- I strongly object.
- I support the idea of a community center. UA seniors killed the idea in the past when my family could have benefited from it. Why is UA still supporting the Senior Center? Remove this service until a center can benefit all age groups, like the one you are proposing.
- I think a center is valuable but bad timing with the large increase due to the school levy.
- I think a community center would be a wonderful addition to the community. It would provide an indoor gathering space for exercise, kids activities, and community gathering. We lived in Ann Arbor and loved and heavily used the local YMCA. It was a healthy social hub.
- I think that the senior center needs improvement, a new building. I don't think we need a building for the community as described. There are so many other places to go in the area.
- I think the current assumption about seniors is biased. Modern seniors are active and not interested in sitting and wood carving. Community center should help organize social interest groups.
- I think the focus of the center should be on healthy living. Weights, cardiovascular, swimming and diving, basketball/volleyball/etc.

The latest school levee really raised our taxes to some of the highest yet, our educational performance (while very good) is not state leading.

STAKEHOLDER FOCUS GROUP SUMMARY

Phase 2

Upper Arlington Community Center Feasibility Study

OVERVIEW

The following is a record of the outcomes from the Community Center Feasibility Study Focus Groups Round Two. Three meetings were held over two days on October 7 and 8. Representatives from the following focus groups participated in the discussion:

- 1. Seniors
- 2. Active Sports
- 3. Recreation Staff
- 4. Community Groups
- 5. Lifelong Learning
- 6. Arts and Culture
- 7. **Business Community**

Each focus group session lasted approximately one hour and included on average five participants. The following are the key themes and outcomes. These notes are a reflection of the feedback from the focus groups as summarized by the consultant team.

Overall support for the draft program

Generally, there was strong support for the draft program. The following are some of the key themes related to the feedback given by participants on the draft program.

• Like the gymnasium space but wished there was 'more' court space/courts

- Would like the gyms to have scoreboard capabilities, separation nets, and multiple foundations for volleyball and pickleball setups to ensure a high degree of flexibility
- Ensure there is adequate height in gyms
- Adjustable hoops in the Mac gym is preferred for younger ages; such assemblies should be heavy duty to hold up to older kids hanging from lowered hoops.
- Bleachers in main gym are desired.
- Side hoop in main gym is preferred.
- Ventilation must be properly handled to avoid heat build-up in the gyms.
- Having the café on the main level came up as something to consider, more accessible by all
- Consider how to better integrate outdoor field sports into the program
- Childcare is important and should be in the program
- Some question for how the office space integrates at the Kingsdale site
- The more community meeting space the better
- Meeting rooms or space by the gym would be great for team meetings, or staging during larger events like tournaments
- Flexible use of the various spaces was a common point, to allow for changing trends in fitness over time, but also for various daily programming.
- Active recreation spaces should consider sound attenuation, and how adjacent (side to side, and above/ below) non-active spaces may be impacted by sound.
- Gyms should be able to accommodate training

for outdoor sports, too (softball, baseball, football, lacrosse).

 Consider how tournaments or special events will handle access, parking, and "downtime".

Preference for location

One of the core areas of focus in the presentation and discussion was the location of the future facility. When asked, participants indicated their preference for the location. The following is a tally of the number of particpants' location preference.

1. Kingsdale/Macy's: 14 2. MSC: 5

3. Undecided: 1

General Feedback on Locations

- Participants like the greenspace at the MSC site and feel it adds to the program; passive programming should be considered in the greenspace. If the location is at Kingsdale additional greenspace would be desired
- Parking was a concern at both sites
- Participants expressed they felt the Kingsdale site created a strong sense of vitality/vibrancy when combined with the surrounding uses
- There was concern for access and traffic at the MSC
- Senior and ADA parking at the Kingsdale site was a concern
- Some participants like the community feel to having get community center and municipal functions in one buildings
- Participants like Kingsdale because it is more accessible by non-motorized options (walk and bike), especially for the students



COMMUNITY MEETING SUMMARY

Phase 2 Upper Arlington Community Center Feasibility Study

OVERVIEW

A public community meeting has hosted on October 8, 2020 to share the overview of the site selection process, review the program resulting from the phase 1 work, and to introduce the initial conceptual plans for the Kingsdale and MSC sites. There were approximately 60 attendees which consisted of the public, city staff, consultant staff, and taskforce and subcommittee members.

The meeting consisted of a consultant presentation with live polling to provide feedback related to process, program, sites. At the conclusion of the presentation, the participants were randomly assigned to "break-out rooms" with the Zoom platform, to be able to discuss the presentation and the concepts presented. When the break-out session completed, participants were brought back to the main meeting space, were asked additional polling questions.

Participant Comments and Questions

Participants were offered the opportunity to share questions and comments in the "chat feature of the application. The consultant team and city staff reviewed the chat questions live and provided answers or followup commentary where possible. Some comments were noted and recognized as not yet having an answer due to the limited detail of the site and program concepts. But these comments are documented here for consideration as the planning process continues.

- It is difficult to understand the scale from these schematic drawings... To get a sense of the size of the pool, etc...
- Is the office going to be like that space over Walgreens? Completely wasted space?
- One elevator is not adequate for the community
- What kind of soundproofing would there be between floors? Would the noise from the gyms be heard on the floor below?
- And also, how accessible would senior space be on the upper floors should elevators be down?
- There does not seem to be enough parking.
- Adequate bicycle storage...Since we put those bike paths in...
- There does not appear to be many meeting rooms for senior or other activities.
- The senior space does look small and inadequate... is this in addition to the senior daycare center, or does this replace the older structure? This would be

- important to understand as I feel our seniors need this central space more than we need gaming spaces...
- Can the office space become something else if necessary? Since COVID, more people are learning that working from home is cost effective. If the space is not fully utilized, can it be shifted to something else..
- YES!!!
- I thought we had restricted the height of buildings in the City. I understand the condos across the street (Arlington Crossing) were thought to be too tall for the landscape.
- Not sure what a MAC gym is.
- I don't like the open air over the basketball courts... sound. I am thinking of RPAC...those basketball/ racquetball courts are sealed off. Kids scream when they play basketball and the thumping balls is loud.
- I am more impressed with the MSC ideas.
- If there is not enough parking, the center will not succeed.
- Is the program equal space-wise whether it is MSC or Kingsdale?
- Is there any distinction in altitude of both spaces?
- Will it be good drainage or better on one or another
- If everything keeps moving forward, what time frame would you see this project being completed?
- Question in my group was asked about a possible performance center similar to Dublin. Also a possibility of some kind of performance area even if it is not a full theater...something to consider... flexibility and multiuse nature of things.
- How feasible is the office space? It's hard to estimate demand with the shift to working from home.
- Is one location more cost effective?
- Would we be leasing space or owning at Kingsdale?
- I'd like to see how the traffic flow in and out would look.
- Will the multiple projects at Kingsdale push the development of the community center further back in time? Will other parts of the project take precedence

for reasons of sequencing or the demands of the developer?

- If the center goes to Kingsdale, the city might want to consider additional pedestrian crossings on Northwest and Tremont, and possibly some No Through Traffic signs on residential streets that could be used as "shortcuts" rather than using major arterials like Fishinger, Zollinger, etc.
- Having used the senior center for a number of years, it seems to me that the space currently available is often underused, the exception being the fitness center, the room for yoga, etc. and the cafeteria.

Unless otherwise noted, only statistically-significant differences that were outside the confidence interval for the overall estimated margin of sampling error have been reported in this presentation of key findings





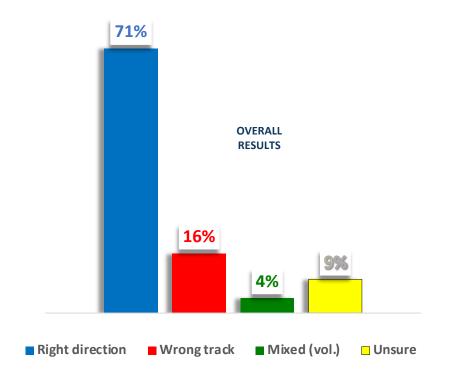

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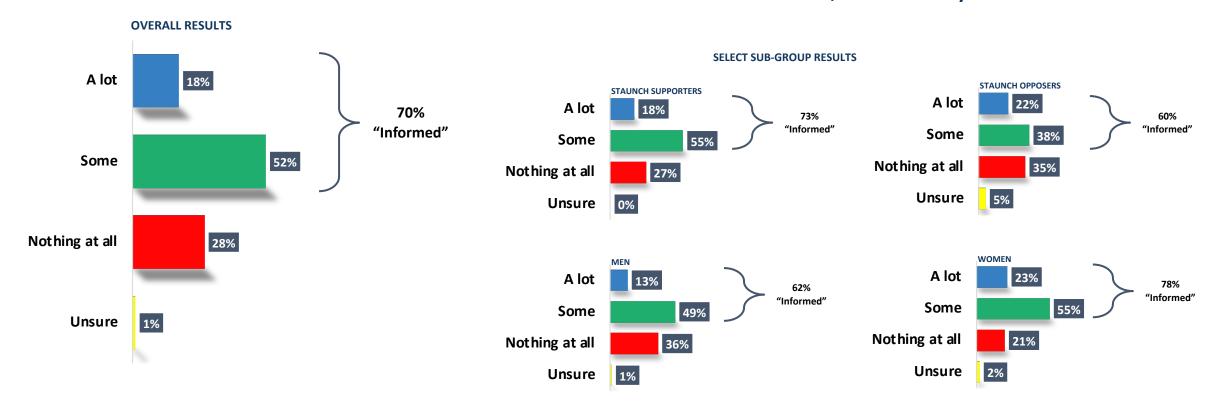

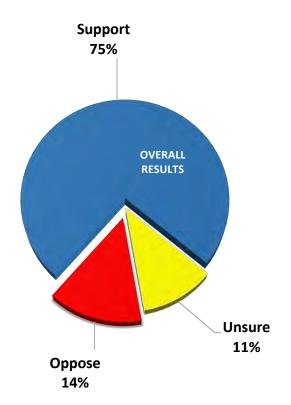
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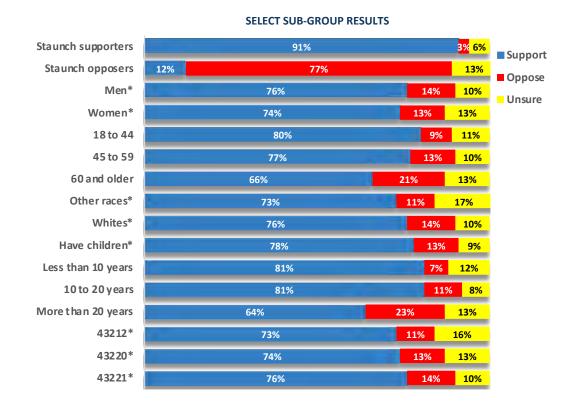

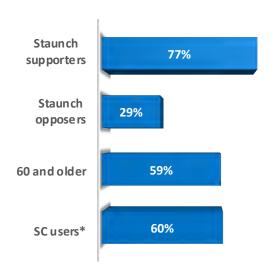

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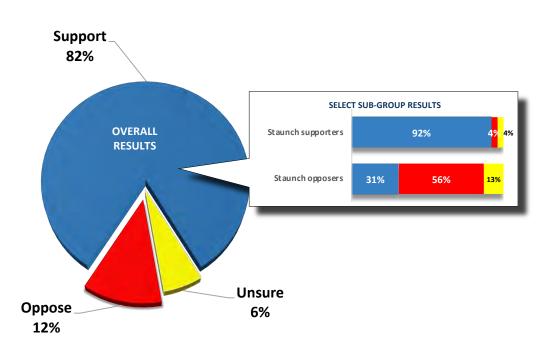
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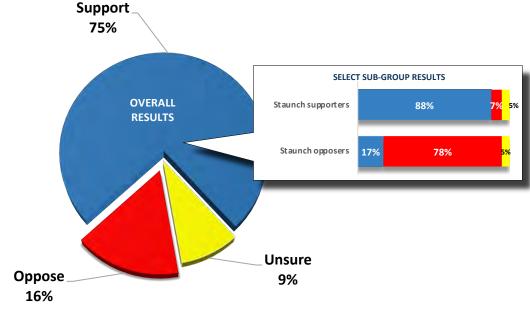

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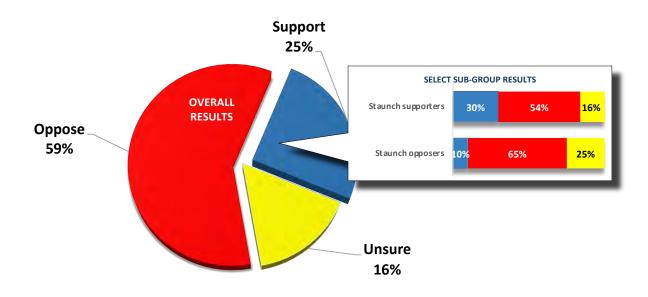


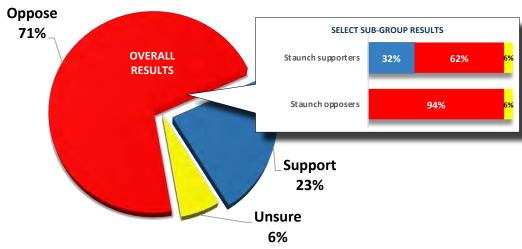

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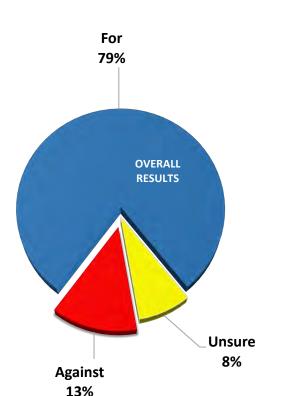

Phase I Findings

After a 10-month study process, the Task Force concluded that the community wants and needs a community center, while identifying at a high level what components should be included, such as aquatics facilities, indoor sports, fitness facilities, dedicated senior programming, general programming and community gathering space, and youth & teen activities.

Phase II

In Phase II, the Task Force is drilling into the details, including:

- **Potential Sites** The Facilities & Partnerships Subcommittee is leading the effort to identify the most feasible options, using selection criteria, such as site size and flexibility, site control, location, creative funding and partnership opportunities.
- **Building Program** The Facilities & Partnerships Subcommittee is also further exploring programming elements, allocation of space, and the development of building concepts for up to two preferred potential sites.
- **Potential Partnerships** The Task Force is guiding conversations with potential partners that may have interest in financial and/or programming participation. This could include local and regional providers of health & wellness components, recreation & leisure programming, education and entertainment opportunities.
- Business Plan The Finance Subcommittee is focused on the finances associated with a community center, such as construction, operations and ongoing maintenance costs, revenue and cost recovery models, and funding mechanisms and partnership opportunities.
- **Final Report to City Council** The Task Force hopes to bring its report to City Council by late 2020/early 2021. If the Task Force concludes a community center is a viable proposition, and should Council be in agreement that a community center should be pursued, the issue could go before voters in May of 2021.

Community Center Feasibility Task Force



There is a strong interest by many residents to revisit the issue of inadequate indoor community gathering space. Most notably, in a statistically valid survey conducted for the 2018 Parks & Recreation Comprehensive Plan, 81% of respondents supported a feasibility study on a multi-generational indoor recreation facility. The plan also brought to light that a number of recreation and leisure components desired by residents are currently lacking in UA—components that would typically be found within a community center.

On July 8, City Council formed the Community Center Feasibility Task Force (previously called the Community Center Study Group) to guide this process.

In July, Council President Kip Greenhill asked the members he planned to nominate as co-chairs— Margie Pizzuti and Nick Lashutka—to take the lead on advance preparations for the Task Force. At press time, Council was expected to vote on the nominees at the August 19 Council Conference Session.

"We're experiencing so much activity to enhance community life in new and exciting ways, as Upper Arlington enters its second century," said Margie Pizzuti. "I am gratified that Council has taken the bold step of revisiting this issue and for their willingness to let residents lead the way."

"It's an honor to be able to serve my community on an issue that is important to my family," said Nick Lashutka. "Like so many parents, we know first-hand the challenges of getting our kids to their extracurricular activities. While we are unsure of what the outcome from this process will be, I'm glad the City has set the framework for us to have this important conversation."

An initial focus of the Task Force will be to determine if Upper Arlington needs a community center. If the answer is yes, they must then find out if the community will actually support such a facility.

The scope of the study will likely include:

- Extensive opportunities for community participation.
- Assessments of existing conditions.
- Reviewing options for replacement of the City's existing Senior Center (as either a combined or standalone facility).
- Reviewing the facilities and models of operation in other communities.
- Reviewing Upper Arlington's history relative to a community center.
- Considering public/private models.
- Identifying the scope, projected costs and possible location.
- Exploring funding strategies for constructing, operating and

maintaining a prospective facility.
 Reporting out the emerging options and cost scenarios, and studying the level of community support.

A first meeting was held August 13. Members shared details of their backgrounds and reasons for participating in the Task Force. Staff presented information that would be of use to the group, including highlights from the 2018 Parks & Recreation Comprehensive Plan and a brief history of past community center efforts. It was agreed that the Task Force should seek the assistance of a consulting firm to help guide their process, to be selected through a formal Request for Qualifications process.

At press time, the fall meeting schedule had not been finalized. In the coming weeks, watch for updates on this process and how you can be involved. Visit upperarlingtonoh.gov where you can register for email updates and send your thoughts to the Task Force.

Community Center Feasibility Task Force Update

A significant recommendation in the 2018 Parks & Recreation Comprehensive Plan is for the City to revisit the issue of inadequate indoor community gathering space. Most notably, in a statistically valid survey, 81% of respondents supported a feasibility study on a multi-generational indoor recreation facility. The plan also brought to light that a number of recreation and leisure components desired by residents are currently lacking in UA—components that would typically be found within a community center.

City Council has established a 16-resident-member Community Center Feasibility Task Force (CCFTF) to guide this process, with Margie Pizzuti and Nick Lashutka serving as co-chairs.

The Task Force determined the process would be best served with the



assistance of a consultant team experienced in conducting feasibility studies of this nature. To that end, a subcommittee was formed this fall to consider proposals. The subcommittee was scheduled to make its recommendation to the Task Force of the Whole.

Thereafter, the recommendation will be shared with City Council, seeking authorization for the City to enter into contract with the consultant to begin the feasibility study process in earnest. It is anticipated that the consultant team will be on board and beginning its work with the Task Force in November.

The Task Force has also decided to form additional subcommittees to work on the following topic areas:

- Finance
- Community Engagement
- Facilities & Partnerships

The work of the Task Force is expected to run into 2020, with the goal of presenting the findings and recommendations back to City Council by the summer. Visit upperarlingtonoh.gov for updates.



Over the summer, the City's Parks & Recreation Department began planning for the replacement of the Reed Road Park playground. Through this process, resident feedback was gathered via a series of activities: a survey regarding playground styles, an open house allowing residents to discuss proposed improvements and final design options, and a follow-up survey for residents to help select the final design.

The results from the second survey revealed a virtual tie between two of the three options, along with suggestions and comments. In all cases, the feedback received stressed the importance of including three main elements in the final design:

- Provide shade options for the playground equipment.
- A climbing component should be incorporated into the design.

 Include separate playground elements for older and younger age groups.

Rather than selecting one of the two options, Staff asked the playground vendor to modify the final design in a way that would incorporate these three elements. The final design (pictured left) now features a large climber, slides, monkey bars and a rope bridge. To help provide more shade, a large shade umbrella will be installed near the center of one of the playground elements-in addition to the existing trees surrounding the playground-to help keep equipment cool on hot, sunny days.

The Parks & Recreation Department is excited to share this final design of the playground with the community, and thanks everyone that participated. The new playground is expected to open in April of 2020.

Community Center Feasibility Task Force Update

As a result of resident feedback, a key 2018 Parks & Recreation Comprehensive Plan recommendation is for the City to revisit the issue of inadequate indoor community gathering space. In July of 2019, City Council established the Community Center Feasibility Task Force (CCFTF) to lead this process. Early on, the Task Force determined they should secure the assistance of a consultant team experienced in conducting studies of this nature.

Over the fall months, the process of identifying a consultant was led by a Selection Subcommittee of the Task Force. By mid-November, a team led by Williams Architects-with subconsultants OHM Advisors and PROS Consultingemerged as the preferred consultant. The full Task Force agreed with the subcommittee and unanimously voted to recommend to City Council that the City enter into contract with Williams Architects to conduct the feasibility study in partnership with the CCFTF. After hearing a report from Task Force Co-Chairs Margie Pizzuti and Nick Lashutka on November 18, Council approved the recommendation on November 25.

The reasoning behind the recommendation included:

- The Williams Architects proposal detailed extensive community engagement activities throughout the study process and a clear understanding of the value placed on obtaining resident input;
- Representatives of Williams
 Architects and OHM Advisors are local to Central Ohio, which will be beneficial to the process;
- The team has previously conducted work in Upper Arlington and already has a good understanding of the community and its expectations—for example Williams Architects assisted PROS Consulting with the 2018



Parks & Recreation Comprehensive Plan, and OHM Advisors led the design process for the new Tremont Pool and Playground at Northam Park and is currently spearheading the Lane Avenue Planning Study;

- Collectively, the team has more experience conducting community center studies:
- The proposal integrated a statistically valid survey early in the process, and emphasized the importance of obtaining objective data that is reflective of the broader community;
- The proposal broke pricing down by project components and divided the work into two phases, with the findings of the first phase framed to help determine the validity of a second phase. Additionally, the proposal was the most cost effective.

A meeting with representatives from Williams Architects and the CCFTF was held mid December, to discuss the timeline for the workplan, establish meeting schedules, and to review plans for engaging with the community on this important issue.

Community Center Feasibility Task Force Update

A key 2018 Parks & Recreation Comprehensive Plan recommendation is that the City revisit the issue of inadequate indoor community gathering space. As a direct result of survey feedback showing strong support for investigating the potential for a community center in UA, in July of 2019 City Council established the Community Center Feasibility Task Force (CCFTF)—comprised of 16 resident volunteers—to lead this process. By the close of the year, the CCFTF had selected a consultant team led by Williams Architects, with OHM Advisors and PROS Consulting.

The feasibility study is being conducted in two phases. First, the CCFTF is seeking answers to three core questions: What kind of community center makes sense for UA? Do we want a community center? Do we need a community center? If the answer to the last two questions is "YES," the study will transition to a second phase that drills into details, such as what facilities to include, where a community center might be located, and the costs for construction, operations and ongoing maintenance.

The CCFTF is in the midst of an extensive phase of community engagement activities. Three components are critical to successfully gathering and considering residents thoughts and ideas within this process:

- First, we need residents to participate. We know the CCFTF, City staff and our consultants don't have all the answers and ideas.
- Second, at this point, residents are encouraged to think expansively about what a community center could be. The study is in the brainstorming and information gathering phase, so any and all ideas are welcome. The hard work of narrowing and focusing will come later.
- Finally, while an email or a conversation is helpful, it isn't as impactful as taking part in a survey, pop up, community meeting or focus group.

These feedback channels are structured to truly capture, account for and analyze all of the feedback that we get. Feedback received through a less structured channel is much more likely to get lost in the noise of everything else.

Focus Groups & Interviews

Interviews and focus group meetings were held in January and February with representatives of groups that might benefit from a community center. This included active sports groups, arts and culture organizations, the senior population, recreation instructors, schools and early education providers, local civic groups and non-profits, businesses, and health and wellness entities.

Community Pop Ups

Surveys

A statistically valid survey is being fielded from late February through the end of March. This type of survey process is designed to ensure that responses are reflective of the community as a whole. Three thousand randomly selected households will be mailed a survey packet that includes a cover letter, hard copy of the survey with a postage-paid envelope, as well as a link to complete the survey online if preferred.

As the statistically valid survey process nears its end, a second version of the survey will be made available online to all residents who wish to participate. The feedback gathered through this supplemental process will be used as additional, anecdotal data.

Youth Engagement

A series of youth specific surveys will be fielded late February, targeting students and providing an opportunity for them to have a voice in the process.

Members of the CCFTF strongly encourage residents to be involved in the feasibility study—your feedback is vital to determining how the City should proceed with this important community issue. Full details of the work of the CCFTF can be found at uacommunitycenter.com.

BI-MONTHLY NEWS FROM THE CITY OF UPPER ARLINGTON



After a 10-month study process, in late June the Community Center Feasibility Task Force (CCFTF) provided a Phase 1 update to City Council and shared that their findings indicated they should transition to Phase 2.

Early in the process, the Task Force had determined that the study should be conducted in two phases. In Phase 1, the CCFTF was seeking answers to three questions: What kind of community center makes sense for UA? Do we want a community center? Do we need a community center? If the answer to the last two questions was "YES," the study would transition to Phase 2, drilling into details such as what facilities to include, where a community center might be located, and the costs for construction, operations and ongoing maintenance.

Phase 1 Findings

In the spirit of making sure the feasibility study is resident-driven, a critical component of Phase 1 was to involve residents as much as possible through an extensive community engagement process. This included focus groups and stakeholder interviews, community pop up activities and public meetings. In March,

a statistically valid survey was fielded to provide further clarity on community sentiment about this issue.

Phase 1 also included a detailed review of existing recreation facilities and programming in the community, market trends and facilities in peer communities. This information, when combined with the feedback obtained through the community engagement activities helped the Task Force identify at a high-level what components should be included in a community center.

These include:

- Aqautics facilities with lap lanes, active play and opportunities for year-round swim lessons and exercise
- Indoor sports, such as basketball, volleyball and pickleball
- Fitness facilities, including cardio vascular equipment, weights, exercise studios and running/ walking track
- Dedicated senior programming and multi-purpose facilities that can accommodate older adult activities but also be available for other uses
- General program, classroom and gathering spaces

- Youth and teen activities
- Various support facilities, including locker rooms and restrooms, lobby, child watch facilities, storage and administration needs.

Phase 2

An August 12 Task Force meeting marked the launch of Phase 2, with the following steps scheduled to occur through the close of 2020:

Community Engagement Initiatives

Similar to Phase 1, the second phase will feature extensive opportunities for community engagement, including but not limited to:

- A second round of stakeholder focus group discussions Tentatively scheduled to occur late September, these discussions will include representatives from active sports groups, the senior population, recreation and lifetime education, arts and culture, as well as business and community group representatives.
- Two community meetings In early October, residents will be invited to participate in a meeting that consid-

ers potential sites and what facilities and programming components are proposed. At a second community meeting toward the close of 2020, a more detailed proposal, along with anticipated construction and operations costs will be shared with the community.

• Surveys - A second statistically valid survey will be fielded as Phase 2 draws to a close to measure resident perceptions and support of the emerging proposal. Additional surveying activities are anticipated, including outreach to the community's youth.

Potential Partnerships

The Task Force will be guiding conversations with potential partners and creation of a Request for Proposals from entities that may have interest in financial and/or programming participation at a community center. This could include but is not limited to local and regional providers of health & wellness components, recreation & leisure programming, education and entertainment opportunities.

Potential Sites

A detailed site review process will be undertaken to identify the most feasible options, using a set of selection criteria, such as:

- Site size and flexibility a preferred site would need to accommodate all the desired uses within a community center, provide adequate parking and if possible, have the ability to expand and grow.
- Site control factors such as current ownership and usage, acquisition costs, zoning and neighborhood compatibility would all be important considerations for identifying one or more prospective sites.
- Location feedback from Phase 1 indicated a strong desire for a community center to be centrally located and easily accessed by all members of the community, young and old alike.
- Preservation of green space park land in Upper Arlington is already

limited and residents have indicated a strong desire for a community center project to not take away from existing park uses.

Building Program

The Facilities and Programming Subcommittee will take a deeper dive into the programming elements within a community center. This will include allocation of space for the various uses, and the subsequent development of building concepts as/when up to two preferred potential sites have been identified.

Business Plan

The Finance Subcommittee's work will focus on the development of a comprehensive overview of the costs associated with a community center, such as:

- Cost estimates for construction, which could include land acquisition
- Operations and ongoing maintenance cost estimates
- Revenue estimates and cost recovery models
- Funding mechanisms for both construction and ongoing operations that could include tapping into existing revenue streams, as well as exploring partnership opportunities, private donations, and economic development tools such as Tax Increment Financing.

Final Report to City Council

The Task Force hopes to bring its work to a conclusion late 2020/early 2021, with a report to City Council. If the Task Force concludes that a community center is a viable proposition for the community, and should Council be in agreement that a community center should be pursued, the issue would likely go before Upper Arlington voters in May of 2021.

About the CCFTF

City Council formed the 16-member Task Force in the summer of 2019, in response to a key recommendation within the 2018 Parks & Recreation Comprehensive Plan for the City to revisit the issue of inadequate indoor community gathering space. This recommendation evolved as a direct result of survey findings showing strong support for investigating the potential for a community center.

Early in the process, the Task Force decided their work would benefit greatly from the assistance of a consultant team experienced in conducting studies of this nature. This team is led by Williams Architects, with sub-consultants OHM Advisors and PROS Consulting.

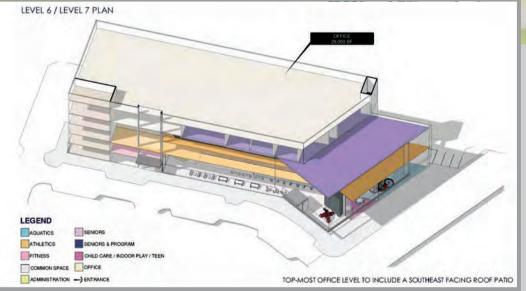

CCFTF Focused on Two Locations

After a 10-month Phase I study process which affirmed that many residents want and need a community center, the Community Center Feasibility Task Force (CCFTF) has transitioned to Phase II. During this phase, the Task Force is drilling into details such as what facilities to include, where a community center might be located, and the costs for construction, operations and maintenance.

Location

To accomplish its review of potential sites, the Facilities Subcommittee directed the consultants to develop a site criteria matrix and scoring system that included:

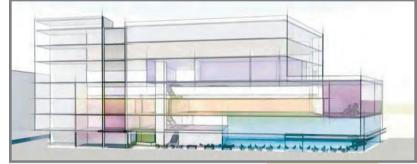
- Acreage to be eligible, sites needed to be a minimum of five acres with adequate parking.
- Site Control each site was scored based on current ownership and usage, acquisition costs, zoning and neighborhood compatibility.
- Location and Access Phase I feedback showed a strong desire for a central location and easy access.
- Preservation of Existing Parkland Phase I feedback also showed a strong desire to preserve existing park uses.
- Availability of Creative Funding Options sites
 were also evaluated based on their potential for
 the use of creative funding mechanisms, such
 as Tax Increment Financing (TIF) or partnership
 opportunities.

The goal of the Subcommittee was to narrow its options to two locations so that the consultants could develop high level concepts of what a building might look like, in terms of its footprint and height, space allocation for the various desired uses, as well as access and parking considerations.

From an initial, high-level discussion of 15 locations, the search was narrowed to eight sites: Fancyburg, Northam, Northwest Kiwanis/Burbank, Reed Road, Sunny 95 and Thompson parks, the former Macy's site at Kingsdale, and the Municipal Services Center. The subcommittee reviewed the site criteria matrix in depth in September. Kingsdale and the Municipal Services Center emerged as the highest scoring locations.



"Massing and stacking" diagrams show how the proposed programming for a community center could be organized within building footprints at a combined community center/municipal services center (above) or on a portion of the former Macy's site at Kingsdale (below).



Kingsdale received the highest score for reasons that included: a central, accessible location; the recent announcement of Continental Real Estate Companies' pending purchase of the site and their willingness to explore a public use with the City as part of redevelopment plans; the potential for creative funding and partnership opportunities; and the fact that it would not impact existing parkland.

The Municipal Services Center scored higher than Kingsdale on the issue of site control and the same for creative funding and partnerships potential, but lost points as a slightly less central and less accessible location, as well as the potential impact on existing greenspace.

Building Program

The Facilities Subcommittee concluded they had the information they needed to focus on these two sites moving forward, directing the consultants to begin development of building concepts for each option. These high-level designs were shared with the subcommittee in early October, and with residents at a Community Meeting on October 8. Both meetings were recorded and can be viewed on the CCFTF website, along with various presentation documents.

The proposed building program portrayed in the two building concepts evolved from Phase I, which had included a review of existing recreation facilities and programming in the community, market trends, facilities in peer communities, and feedback obtained through the community engagement activities and a statistically valid survey.

These elements include:

- Aquatics facilities with lap lanes, active play and opportunities for year-round swim lessons and exercise
- Indoor sports, such as basketball, volleyball and pickleball
- Fitness facilities, including cardio vascular equipment, weights, exercise studios and running/ walking track
- Dedicated senior programming and multi-purpose facilities that can accommodate older adult activities but also be available for other uses
- General program, classroom and gathering spaces
- Youth and teen activities
- Various support facilities, including locker rooms and restrooms, lobby, child watch facilities, storage and administration needs

At the Community Meeting, residents indicated a high level of satisfaction with the proposed programming, but further insight from the community on programming elements will be sought in the coming weeks.

Business Plan

The Finance Subcommittee is focused on the development of a comprehensive overview of the costs associated with a community center, such as:

- Construction estimates
- Operations and ongoing maintenance
- Revenue estimates and cost recovery models
- Funding mechanisms for construction and operations that could include tapping into existing revenue streams, as well as exploring partnership opportunities,

private donations, and economic development tools such as Tax Increment Financing.

What Do You Think?

In the month of November, the Task Force will be seeking feedback on the emerging proposal to help them formulate a recommendation to City Council.

A statistically valid survey will be fielded by telephone in mid-November. If your household is contacted and asked to participate, please know that your input will be a critical component of the final decision-making process.

An online version of the survey will also be available, giving all members of our community a chance to share your thoughts with the Task Force.

Kingsdale Mixed-Use Project



Following a September announcement of its intent to purchase the former Macy's site at Kingsdale from The Kroger Co, Continental Real Estate, Inc. submitted a Preliminary Development Plan to the City for review by the Board of Zoning and Planning. At press time, BZAP action on the proposal was pending at its October 19 meeting.

The proposal places an emphasis on alternate housing options, reflective of current development trends and to complement the existing retail/restaurant and office space at Kingsdale and would be comprised of:

- A six-story building with 104 senior housing units, on the northwest portion of the site, with a 6,000 square foot restaurant, including outdoor dining, on the ground floor facing Tremont Road.
- A seven-story building to the east/center of the property, along Northwest Boulevard, with five floors of 383 apartments and two amenity courtyards over a two-story parking garage.
- *A nine-story building on the southwest corner, with 75 two-bedroom apartments, 50,000 square feet of office space on the top two floors, and structured parking. *NOTE: This area has been identified as a potential location for a community center, subject to the Community Center Feasibility Task Force study process that is currently underway.
- Eight, two-story townhouses fronting Northwest Boulevard that would back up to the two levels of structured parking for the seven-story building.
- The two structured parking arrangements, combined with surface parking, would comprise a total of 755 new spaces. Additionally, Continental has secured a shared-use agreement for up to 150 existing parking spaces at the north end of the Giant Eagle Market District parking lot.

Lane Avenue Planning Study Update

The Lane Avenue Planning Study was initiated by City Council in the summer of 2019, to help the City better understand the impacts of growth within this busy and evolving commercial district, and to put in place a frame-

work to guide this growth in a way that benefits the district and community as a whole, while providing appropriate transitions into the surrounding neighborhoods. The study included:

- Three phases of citizen engagement.
- A review of existing guiding documents and past studies, such as the Master Plan and Unified Development Ordinance.
- The development of streetscape standards to enhance the appeal of the district, with a focus on pedestrian activities, accessibility, outdoor dining, and opportunities for public art and public gathering spaces.
- A review of and recommendations for modifying the City's commercial design standards.
- A comprehensive traffic evaluation of Lane Avenue from Riverside Drive to SR 315.

The resulting Lane Avenue Study Report was first shared with Council in the summer, and was adopted by Council on September 14

A revised and greatly enhanced Lane Avenue Planned Mixed Use District zoning document has been prepared to clearly set forth the City's guidelines and requirements for future redevelopment within the district. At press time, these proposed code amendments were scheduled for final review and action by the Board of Zoning and Planning at its October 19 meeting. Thereafter, it is scheduled for City Council review and action per the following schedule:

- Monday, November 16 Council Conference Session initial discussion (public testimony is not typically taken at Conference Sessions)
- Monday, November 23 City Council Meeting First Reading, Public Hearing
- Monday, December 14 City Council Meeting Second Reading, Public Hearing, Council Action

BI-MONTHLY NEWS FROM THE CITY OF UPPER ARLINGTON



After a process lasting approximately 18 months, the work of the Community Center Feasibility Task Force is concluding, with next steps for this important community issue now in the hands of City Council.

On December 9, the Task Force met to receive reports from its three subcommittees and to consider a draft Resolution outlining its recommendations to Council. Members of the Task Force were unanimous in their support of the Resolution.

At a Special City Council Meeting held December 16, Task Force Co-Chairs Margie Pizzuti and Nick Lashutka - and Subcommittee Chairs Supen Bowe (Community Engagement), Greg Comfort (Facilities) and Matt Rule (Finance) - provided an extensive overview of the study process, their findings and recommendations.

Survey Highlights

The results from a second statistically valid survey were shared at both the

December Task Force and City Council meetings. Much of the results affirmed previous findings from numerous community engagement activities and the first survey, while also gauging resident sentiment on the options that had been under development during Phase II of the study process. Some survey highlights include:

- Awareness of the study process was high, at 70.5%
- There is strong support for the City constructing a community center, at 75.1%

"Massing and stacking" diagrams created for the Task Force show how the various desired programming elements could be incorporated into a community center at Kingsdale, with aquatics on the ground level, fitness facilities and gymnasiums on levels 2 & 3, running/walking track on level 4, senior space, shared programming space and outdoor patio on level 5, with office space on levels 6 & 7.

- There is strong support for including Senior Center programming & facilities, at 69.6%
- The former Macy's site at Kingsdale is the preferred location, at 74.8%
- There is support for including office space to offset operating & maintenance costs, at 68.3%

When asked if they would support a community center issue on the ballot:

- 74.55% supported the City issuing up to \$55 million in bonds - without raising taxes - to construct a community center.
- 63.7% supported a 30-year, 1/2 mill property tax increase to construct a community center.

The Task Force Recommendations

The Task Force recommendations that were shared with City Council include:

- It is feasible for the City to construct, operate and maintain a community center.
- The facility should include program space for seniors and replace the current Senior Center.
- The community center should be more than just a recreational facility, serving as a central gathering place for the whole community.
- The former Macy's site at Kingsdale is the preferred location.
- Expected to cost approximately \$54 million to construct, this can be funded without an increase in taxes by using a combination of Tax Increment Financing (TIF) funds, excess City funds, community center office lease revenues and hotel/motel taxes, along with private donations.
- A business model should be pursued based on competitive market rate memberships and usage fees, with a goal of achieving a minimum cost recovery level of 85%.
- Membership and usage fees should be tiered, with options to accommodate senior residents and the operating budget should include a scholarship fund to assist residents







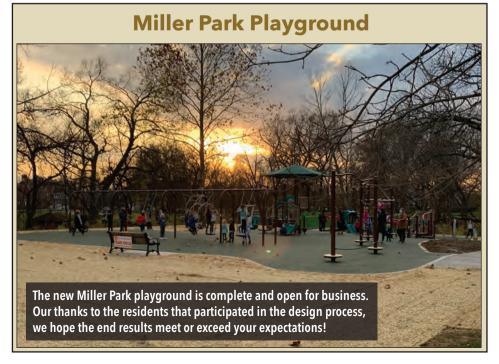




- facing financial barriers to participation.
- Existing Senior Center and Recreation program funds should be redirected to support the community center.
- The community center business model should include significant annual contributions to a fund for future capital expenditures, such as maintenance and equipment replacement.

Work is underway to prepare a final report on the work of the Community Center Feasibility Task Force. This will be presented to Council at a Special City Council Meeting scheduled for Monday, January 11, beginning at 7:30 pm. At this meeting, Council will also consider a Resolution to take this issue to a vote of the people on May 4, 2021.

We encourage you to become informed on this important community issue as we move toward asking Upper Arlington residents to vote on this issue.

A Request for Qualifications has been issued, with a deadline of Sept. 23, A subcommittee will review and make a recommendation to the Task Force of the Whole at its October 30 meeting. Thereafter, the recommendation will be shared with City Council, seeking authorization for the City to enter into contract with the consultant. It is anticipated the consultant will begin its work in November.

The Task Force has a full agenda for its October 14 meeting, with reports from its three subcommittees, and a discussion on the feasibility study timeline, recommendations and deliverables.

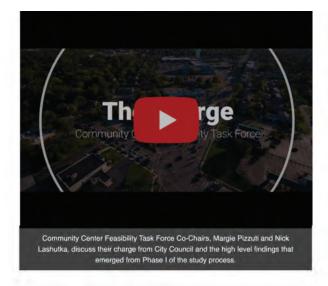

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Phase II Survey Findings

Continuing the Task Force's commitment to seeking community feedback, a statistically valid telephone survey of 300 randomly selected registered voters was conducted in mid-November. Once that was completed, an online version was made available to all residents, yielding 1,609 responses. Some key findings include:

- High Level of Awareness 70.5% of respondents had heard some or a lot of information about the study.
- Strong Support for a Community Center 75.1% of respondents are supportive of the City pursuing a community center.
- Support for Including Senior Center Programming and Facilities —
 There is strong support for including Senior Center programming and facilities within a community center, at 69.6%.
- Preferred Location Identified The former Macy's site at Kingsdale is the preferred location, with 74.8% - 82.1% support.
- Support for Including Revenue Generating Office Space 68.3% of respondents expressed support for including office space as a means to offset operating and maintenance costs.
- · Voter Support on a Ballot Issue:
 - 74.55% of voters would support the City issuing up to \$55 million in bonds—without raising any new taxes—to construct a community center.
 - 63.7% of voters would support a 30-year, 1/2 mill property tax increase.

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Task Force Recommendations Head to City Council

At its December 9 meeting, the Task Force voted unanimously to adopt a Resolution of Support for the Feasibility of a Community Center for the City of Upper Arlington. Based on its findings from an approximately 18-month study process, some of the key Task Force conclusions and recommendations include:

- It is feasible for the City to construct, operate and maintain a community center
- It should include program space for seniors, thereby replacing the current Senior Center on Ridgeview Road
- . The former Macy's site at Kingsdale is the preferred location
- Based on detailed financial analysis, a community center is possible without an increase in taxes
