- Daily Admission: \$10 for Residents, \$20 for Non-Residents (initially, Non-Residents will be limited to one daily admission).


# Work in UA? Enjoy the Resident Rate!

Located on Level 5, the Event Center includes one large event space that can accommodate up to 250 guests banquet style, or can be split into three smaller spaces. Other amenities include a south-facing outdoor Skyline Balcony with incredible views, a catering kitchen, a green room/dressing room, and an art gallery, which can extend the overall event space.

# **New Alarm Permit Requirement for Residents & Businesses**

The City is implementing a new alarm permit requirement for all properties with burglary or fire alarm systems. Beginning February 25, 2025, the PM AM Corporation will oversee the permitting process and tracking of false alarms. This partnership will streamline operations, reduce the burden of false alarms on public safety, and ensure effective responses during actual emergencies.

# Why Do I Need an Alarm Permit?

An alarm permit helps ensure that UA's police and fire services can respond quickly and effectively in emergencies. By maintaining an up-to-date permit, property owners provide essential information, including:

Emergency contact details

- Property specifics
- Backup contacts

This information allows public safety personnel to quickly access critical details during an emergency, ensuring faster, more accurate responses.

# Obtaining or Renewing an Alarm Permit

- Existing Permit Holders: If you already have an alarm permit, you must resubmit your permit filing starting February 25. There is no renewal fee.
- New Permit Applicants: If you have a burglary or fire alarm system but do not currently have an alarm permit, you are required to apply for one to comply with the City's ordinance.

To apply or renew your permit, residents or businesses must create an account through the False Alarm Management System Portal, which can be accessed using the QR code shown here.

# **Northwest Kiwanis Park Temporary Art Installation**

This summer, the City will debut a temporary art installation at Northwest Kiwanis Park, designed by artist Marcia Armstrong. Selected through a formal process, Armstrong's artwork will be installed as part of the City's ongoing commitment to enriching the community through diverse art experiences. Following the 2019 Arts and Culture Master Plan, the Cultural Arts Division and Commission established formal policies and



processes for bringing public art to all areas of Upper Arlington. This project brings public art to the northern part of Upper Arlington, an area identified as lacking such installations.

Armstrong is a dynamic artist whose career has spanned a range of disciplines, from ceramics to interdisciplinary installations that merge art, science, and environmental studies. With a Bachelor of Fine Arts from OSU and additional studies in EcoArt and

digital media, her work emphasizes the intersection of the natural world and human experience. Her installations have been showcased in venues like the Smithsonian and Renwick Galleries and more recently in naturalized spaces such as Chadwick North Arboretum. Armstrong seeks to foster connections between people and the ecosystems that sustain them, creating works that inspire reflection and conversation.

This installation aims to inspire visitors to engage with nature and art, sparking reflection and conversation. This project will celebrate the natural beauty of the community, highlight the importance of naturalized areas in the park, and educate the public on the artist's creative process. Highlights of City Council & Its Policy Decisions

# Council Accepting Applications for Boards & Commissions, and Master Plan Task Force

The City is fortunate to have many residents who are willing to donate their time and expertise serving on the various Boards and Commissions that have been formed to address specific community issues. In return, these individuals are afforded the opportunity to help shape their community in areas that are of interest to them.

Several seats will be expiring on June 30, and City Council is seeking applications from residents interested in serving on the following Boards and Commissions, with an application deadline of Wednesday, April 30, 2025.

- Civil Service Commission prescribes, amends, and enforces rules for the classification of positions in the civil service of the City. Civil Service Rules apply to appointments, promotions, removals, transfers, layoffs, suspensions, reductions, and reinstatements. On average, the Commission meets twice per year.
- Community Relations Committee

   typically meets the fourth Thursday of each month, to help support UA as a welcoming community, to promote understanding and respect, foster diverse culture, and to enhance the City's vision to support respect and fairness. Members also participate in extracurricular CRC activities and community events throughout the year.
- Cultural Arts Commission typically meets the first Wednesday of each month to advise and support the Cultural Arts Division Staff in their mission to provide and promote a diverse, lively, accessible arts environment that advances the cultural assets and enriches the life of the community.



- Master Plan Task Force play a key role in shaping the long-term vision for Upper Arlington. Working with consultants, City Council and City Staff, members will collaborate with stakeholders, review data and trends, and provide input on policies related to land use, parks, economy, community appearance, community facilities & services, housing, infrastructure & transportation, technology, and sustainability. The contributions of the Task Force will help ensure the plan reflects the needs and aspirations of residents, fostering a vibrant, well-planned future for the City. The Task Force will begin what is expected to be a two-year process toward the close of 2025.
- Medical Advisory Board provides ongoing professional supervision, training, and support for the City's Emergency Medical Services program. The Board works in conjunction with the Fire Division and meets up to two times per year.
- Parks & Recreation Advisory Board provides input for parks, recreation, cultural arts services, and facilities. The Board educates the community on services provided by the Parks & Recreation Department. The Board meets up to six times annually.

Tax Incentive Review Council –
meets once a year to review tax
agreements and compliance for
tax-exempt properties located within the City.

# City Winter Utility Invoice Includes Solid Waste Fee "Holiday" Finance | 614-583-5291

**Deadline for Payment: March 15** 

The winter utility invoices from the City was mailed to UA households in February. These invoices typically include the Solid Waste Fee, the Stormwater Utility Fee, and in some cases, a Neighborhood Utility Lighting Fee, however in this instance the Solid Waste fee has been waived. City Council decided to provide a one-time holiday from the solid waste fees for UA homeowners. Even after increasing spending on roads, sewers, parks and the community center, the City has exceeded its targeted cash reserves. Therefore, the City is not charging residential solid waste fees for the first half of 2025. This saves each household approximately \$150 (\$136 for those with a senior discount) at a total cost of \$2 million to the City. Fees are still required for the solid waste premium service option.

# Sustainability Fair 10 am-2 pm, Saturday, April 5 **Tremont Library**

The City's Green Team will be participating in the Upper Arlington Library's Sustainability Fair, scheduled for Saturday, April 5, with the following activities:

General Household Items Collection: Goodwill will be on hand in the parking lot to collect clothing & shoes, books, furniture, housewares & home decor, and musical instruments.

Styrofoam Collection: Representatives from Eco Development will be in the parking lot collecting styrofoam. Accepted items include protective packaging (often found in electronics and appliance packaging) and foam coolers. NO packing peanuts or take-out containers.

Before or after this event, you can take styrofoam to the City of Hilliard's drop-off location, at 3770 Municipal Way.

E-Waste Collection: Also look for our e-waste collection in the parking lot, courtesy of Columbus Micro Systems.

- Accepted items include: Computers, laptops, phones, stereo equipment, small kitchen appliances, cameras, and all cords & plugs
- Not Accepted: Light bulbs, large appliances, items containing Freon, and any chemicals or household hazardous waste

Before or after this event, you can always use our e-waste drop-off location, at the Public Service Center, 4100 Roberts Road, open 7 am-4 pm Monday-Friday.

# **Columbia Gas UA Projects**

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Columbia Gas will undertake a series of major upgrades in UA, beginning in 2025. This includes replacing old high pressure gas lines with new, federally mandated steel pipes with safety features. The proposed route for the first phase will enter UA at the easternmost point of Zollinger Road (from OSU's west campus), head south on North Star Road, west on Ridgeview Road, south on Brandon Road, then west on Northam Road to Northwest Boulevard. This phase includes two proposed above-ground utility stations: replacement of an existing station on Brandon Road, and construction of a new utility station on Ridgeview Road.

Columbia Gas representatives hosted several public meetings at the close of 2024, and a series of "office hours" in the New Year, enabling residents to learn more and share feedback. The team also attended the January 27 City Council Meeting to present an overview of the planned upgrades (this presentation was recorded and can be viewed on the City's website). At press time, a February 24 Public Forum had been scheduled to share proposed renderings for the above-ground utility stations.

# **Envision Henderson Report**

For much of 2024, the City was focused on the "Envision Henderson" West Henderson Road Vision Plan, led by MKSK, a local community planning and urban design firm. The study generated extensive input, with participation from



more than 800 residents and stakeholders. Feedback on concepts for improving roadway safety and aesthetics, creating a northern gateway, facilitating live + work neighborhood redevelopment opportunities, and expanding sidewalk and trail connections were all positively received.

The final report and recommendations will be presented to City Council at its March 3 meeting, which begins at 7 pm at 3600 Tremont Road.

Prioritization of the recommendations and an implementation timeline will be developed and shared with the community by mid-year.

# Northam Park Tennis and Pickleball Courts Ribbon Cutting Ceremony

# 4 pm, Thursday, May 1

A second ribbon cutting ceremony is on the horizon, as we celebrate the completion of major upgrades to the Northam Tennis clay courts and facility, a new and much improved Northam Park service building with year-round restrooms, new shelters, AND the installation of the City's first dedicated pickleball courts.

Recognizing the increasing popularity of pickleball, an online reservation system will be implemented through *parks.uaoh.net* during the months of April-October, between the hours of 8 am-8 pm. However, if no reservations have been made for one or more of the courts, they will be available for open play. And open play is in effect on the courts for any early birds or night owls

Plus, you can still make use of the combined pickleball/tennis courts at Fancyburg and Thompson parks. And plans are in the works to add pickleball lines to the tennis court at Sunny 95 Park later this year.

# 2024 Income Tax Filings

Deadline: Tuesday, April 15

All residents aged 18 years and over must file an annual income tax return with the City, regardless of whether any tax is due. The City uses the services of the Regional Income Tax Agency (RITA) for the processing of UA income taxes.

RITA's Worthington office, located at 760 Lakeview Plaza Boulevard, Suite 400, provides in person taxpayer assistance Monday-Friday, from 9 am-4 pm. Please bring all necessary documents, including:

- W-2 Forms from all employers, and any W-2G Forms and 1099-MISC Forms.
- Federal Form 1040, Federal Schedules C, E & F, Federal forms K-1, 2106 (if applicable).

 Addresses and dates for each location in which you resided during 2022 and any previous tax year filings being submitted

The City's Finance Department is also available for in-person assistance, and taxpayers can drop off their information at convenient, secure drop boxes at either the RITA/Worthington location or the Municipal Services Center Kenny Road parking lot - please include a phone number or email address in case there are questions.

Fire hydrant flushing will occur week-days, April 15-May 3. It is recommended that you refrain from doing laundry on the day hydrants are flushed in your area. Before resuming laundering, partially fill washers on the cold setting until the water runs clear Run a sample of water into a transparent container to check for settling or discoloration. Once the water is clear, the washer can be spun out to drain the tub for a normal laundry load. Turn on all faucets and allow water to run until it appears clear. # Change Your Clock, Change Your Battery®

To kick off Daylight Savings Time, clocks "spring forward" at 2 am, Sunday

morning. The Fire Division reminds you this is a good time to change the batteries in your smoke alarms. Smoke alarms should be tested monthly and if an alarm chirps, warning the battery is low, replace the battery right away.

# **Building Permit Reminders**

If you have plans to remodel part of your home, our Community Development Department can help with an important first step: checking to see if your project requires a permit. Examples of projects that require a permit include:

- Constructing a deck
- Finishing or altering a basement
- If framing is removed/added to a kitchen/bathroom or the layout is altered
- If non-load-bearing walls and/ or soffits are removed, altered or added
- Adding a porch or covered entry

Your voice matters in facilities master planning! Since the fall, hundreds of students, staff members, parents/ guardians and community members have lent their voices to phase two of the facilities master planning process for the aging middle schools and Burbank Early Childhood School.

"Our school facilities are a cornerstone of the Upper Arlington community, and we are so grateful for those who have come alongside us so far in this process to help shape the future of our schools," said Superintendent Robert Hunt, Ph.D. "If you haven't gotten involved in the process, we need to hear from you. Your perspective is critical as we determine the best path forward for our schools."

# What's Happened in the Assessments Phase

In the fall of 2024, Upper Arlington Schools kicked off phase two of facilities master planning, focused on the schools that were not touched in phase one – the aging middle schools and Burbank Early Childhood School. In the first part of the process, the Assessments Phase, the district has:

- Formed building teams of approximately 100 community and staff volunteers to dive deeply into the physical and educational challenges of each building and explore possible solutions.
- Invited the community to learn more and share their thoughts through two rounds of community engagement sessions in the final months of 2024.

Commissioned a new round of professional facility assessments, updating the work done in 2015, to inform cost estimates for maintaining and repairing the buildings, as well as the development of additional options that would tackle both the physical and educational needs of the buildings.

Based on the results of the physical assessments, the estimated cost to maintain and repair the three buildings is \$103.7 million. High demand in the central Ohio market has led to a steep increase in construction costs in recent years. Several large-scale projects such as Intel, Google and Honda are contributing to shortages for labor and supplies.

# What's Next in the Options Phase

The master planning process is now in the Options Phase. The community and staff volunteers on the building teams have worked together to explore possible solutions that were brought forward to the community in February at the third round of community engagement sessions. Options range from repairing and maintaining (addressing the physical needs of the buildings) to renovating or rebuilding (addressing the physical and educational needs).

Community members who were unable to attend the meeting can provide their feedback on the initial options through an online survey available at www.uaschools.org/facilities. The survey will be open through Sunday, March 9. This feedback will be used to revise the initial planning options and potentially investigate additional options.

Later in the spring, the community will have multiple opportunities to share their thoughts on the revised planning options and their estimated costs at the fourth round of community engagement sessions in May.

An online community survey will also follow this round of meetings.

"As we move forward, I encourage all community members to engage with this process," Dr. Hunt added. "Attend meetings, ask questions and share your feedback. No decisions have been made, and this is your chance to play an active role in shaping the future of our schools."



# **Treasurer's Notes**

Being good stewards of taxpayer dollars is a core responsibility for our district, and wisely managing our resources



is central to that commitment. Each year, we undergo a thorough, third-party financial review conducted by the State of Ohio Auditor's Office. This independent evaluation ensures transparency and accountability in our financial practices. A team from the auditor's office carefully examines our records and processes, providing an important check on our fiscal management.

I am proud to announce that, for the 2023-2024 fiscal year, our district has once again earned a clean audit opinion and received the prestigious Auditor of State Award. This achievement reflects our ongoing dedication to sound financial practices and our commitment to the community. You can view the full audited financial report for fiscal year 2024 on our website at www.uaschools. org/departments/treasurer/annual-audits.

The state audit is just one way for stakeholders to stay informed about how taxpayer dollars are being used in the district. For a more detailed look at our financial picture, our 2024-2025 Financial Update will be available later this spring on our website at www. uaschools.org/treasurer. This report

complements our annual Quality Profile, providing a deeper dive into the district's funding sources, expenditures and future fiscal considerations.

In addition to these reports, our Treasurer's Office webpage hosts other key financial documents, including monthly financial updates presented at regular Board of Education meetings and our five-year forecast. The five-year forecast is a critical planning tool that helps us project the district's financial needs over time.

Another vital resource for our long-term planning is the enrollment projection report. Prepared by an independent firm, this report analyzes factors such as real estate trends and birth data to estimate future student enrollment. By understanding potential growth, we can better plan for staffing, facilities and resources.

The latest enrollment projection, completed by Cooperative Strategies, was shared with the Board of Education approximately a year ago, and the district will again be commissioning a new enrollment study this spring. In general, we continue to see steady growth in our enrollment districtwide, with the number of K-12 students expected to increase by approximately 400 students, or 6%, by 2033-2034. As our enrollment continues to grow, the district will remain focused on efficiently managing resources and planning for additional students and their academic needs.

# Last year was one of exceptional achievements for the Upper Arlington Public Library. Through the dedicated efforts of our staff and a focus on community-first services, we've set new records in programming attendance and circulation, affirming our role as a cornerstone of education, enrichment, and connection in Upper Arlington.

### **Circulation Success Stories**

Our collection continues to evolve to meet the needs of our patrons, and the results speak for themselves:

- Adult and Juvenile Books: Print collections are thriving, with a nearly 30% increase in circulation compared to 2019. Juvenile books saw remarkable growth, with nearly 100,000 more checkouts than in 2022 and 60,000 more than in 2016.
- E-Circulation: Digital resources like Overdrive, Libby have been a game-changer. Our \$100,000+ investment in OverDrive Advantage has provided cardholders priority access to eBooks and audiobooks, significantly reducing wait times and driving usage. Audiobooks account for 40% of our OverDrive circulation, highlighting their importance in our digital offerings.
- Video Games: This collection continues to grow in popularity, thanks to expanded funding and increased availability.

With certain formats like DVDs, CDs, and physical audiobooks experiencing declines, we've strategically shifted our purchasing to align with patron demand,

ensuring our resources are used on items that our users need most.

Additionally, our database usage increased by 42% compared to 2019, driven by resources like *The New York Times*, *Consumer Reports*, and *A-Z Databases*, ensuring patrons have access to valuable, reliable information.

# **Programming Milestones**

Programming in 2024 was nothing short of stellar:

- Adult Programs: Attendance increased by 2,000 compared to 2023, with offerings tailored to varied interests and schedules.
- Youth Programs: We hosted the most children's and teen programs in years, with 37,600 attendees. Teen programming reached new heights, offering 100 events with 1,600 participants.

# Strategic Investments for the Future

As part of our ongoing strategic plan, we've refined services at each location based on space and community needs, and have expanded our resources and staffing toward our outreach initiatives. We are planning for the re-opening of the Lane Road Branch late Spring 2025.

# **Looking Ahead to 2025**

Our financial outlook remains steady, with estimated revenue of \$9.3 million. In addition to operating expenses, we're planning a \$1.9 million investment from the building improvement fund to support critical projects, including the Tremont Road roof replacement.

As we celebrate a remarkable 2024, we look forward to continuing our mission to serve, inspire, and innovate for the Upper Arlington community. Thank you for making the library an integral part of your lives!

# Facilities Update

Here are the latest developments under our Master Facilities Plan.

- The Lane Road Branch Improvements project is well underway and remains on schedule for a late Spring 2025 completion. At press time, interior demolition has concluded and construction of the new ceiling on the first floor has begun. Soon work will start on the replacement and reconfiguration of HVAC and lighting systems throughout the building.
- Replacement of the roof at the Tremont Road Branch is a top priority for 2025 to address an increasing number of leaks and other issues. We are expecting this work to be publicly bid and construction to begin this summer. This location is expected to remain open while this work is completed.

Interesting plot twists abound in this book. When Amber befriends socialite and philanthropist Daphne, the wife






# The Bog Wife




realism twist, The Bog Wife is perfect for fans of odd, unsettling tales.


